

Co-op Drive For Members BLOCK 40 COPS FIRST PLACE

Block 40 clinched the first place in the Co-op membership drive, according to the unofficial incomplete returns with \$1780 while Block 39 remained in second.

The biggest cash turn in from Wednesday to Saturday returns was made by Block 7 which turned in \$825 to garner third place with a final total of \$1345.

Block 31 and 30 jumped into sixth and eighth places, respectively.

The Co-op block delegates will meet Thursday at 1:30 p.m. in Hall 18, to make a complete report on the membership drive of their respective blocks. Katsujiro Iseri will preside.

Another warning was issued by Project Director Paul A. Taylor to persons attempting to leave the Center at any time without passes.

WAR BOARD APPRAISES IDLE FARM MACHINERY

The following information as received from the Evacuee Property supervisor in Los Angeles regarding idle farm machinery was released by the local Legal office:

"The USDA War board has been making appraisals on all stored machinery within the county and placing tags stating that consent must be obtained from the War board before removal. The object of these tags and the demand for permission to remove the equipment is for the purpose of maintaining an up to date inventory of stored equipment. Insofar as we have been able to determine, there has been no refusal of permission to have property removed when such removal is a legitimate sale, lease or shipment out of the county. There is no move to take general possession after

TRUST IN CAMP SAVAGE GRADUATES TOLD

(The following is another of the series of articles being released for publication in the center newspapers by the Military Intelligence Service Language school, Camp Savage, Minn.)

Another significant milestone in the story of nisei American contribution to the war effort of the United States was marked by a unique graduation ceremony which took place on June 18, 1943, at Camp Savage, Minn. The simple but impressive outdoor exercise ended an intensive course of study for the grad-

uates, a great portion of whom were volunteers from the relocation centers.

The graduates who received their diplomas as specialists were addressed by a high-ranking major general from Army headquarters in Washington and were told of the trust and confidence their performance and that of their predecessors in the field had won.

In the various utterances made during the ceremony, it was stressed again and again that

Boston Able To Provide Temporary Housing Race Problem To Be Topic CLEARANCE NECESSARY

"Is There a Superior Race?" will be the topic for the adult forum set for tonight at 8 o'clock in Hall 33 with Shugo Seno as chairman.

Dr. Edgar C. McVoy of the Community Analysis department will be the speaker.

A specialist in the problems of the minority groups, Dr. McVoy majored in sociology at the University of Minnesota.

Employment problems of the minority groups and racial differences will be discussed.

Arrangements have been completed by the Boston WRA to provide temporary quarters in private homes for 15 to 20 persons until jobs and permanent housing can be found, informed Relocation Supervisor Roger F. Clapp.

These people must have their clearance either through Forms 258a or 258b which allow entrance into the Eastern Defense Command and permit to work in defense plants.

Those seeking Eastern Defense ratings are asked to apply at the Leaves office immediately as all names will be checked in Washington in the order received.

Job openings in the Eastern area were described as broad and varied, and except in fairly limited districts, the housing situation is said not to be too difficult.

Positions for one or more electrical engineers with experience in research and development are open at the Electrical Connectors and Manufacturing company, South Milwaukee, Wis.

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SINCE EVACUATION

Times Have Changed

In the spring of 1942 we were told that it was our patriotic duty to our country to cooperate in the evacuation from the Pacific Coast states and so we performed our patriotic service by moving to the relocation centers in the inland areas.

Today, a little more than a year after the evacuation, we are told that it is our patriotic duty to leave the centers and assist in the all-out war production program.

On the surface, these two statements would appear to be contradictory, but times have changed during the year interval. When evacuation took place, our country had been at war for only four or five months; we are now in the 20th month of the war since Dec. 7, 1941.

Because of the war hysteria which gripped the nation right after Pearl Harbor, it was relatively simple for racial minded groups to stampede Americans into believing that evacuation of all persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast was absolutely necessary. This placed loyal Americans of Japanese descent in a quandary for if we complied with the Army orders it meant great suffering and financial losses and if we refused we would be laying our-

selves open to attack as being unpatriotic. So we accepted the inevitable and did our patriotic duty.

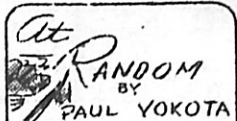
Since the entrance of our nation into this global conflict, millions of men have been drained off from our industries and farms into the armed forces. This has led to a serious shortage of manpower. Certainly, the women of America have accepted the challenge and have attempted to fill the gaps, but they have been unable to perform all of the necessary work.

So what? the cynics will say. We have cooperated in the evacuation, 5000 nisei were already in the United States Army at that time and a 1000 more have volunteered for the special combat team. What more can be expected of us now? That is the viewpoint of the embittered evacuees. If we permit ourselves to think selfishly we will be accepting the same attitude.

At this time the resettlement program is in full swing and it is calling for the services of all able-bodied and unencumbered evacuees who are able to leave the centers. This is the real test of our loyalty. Those who are true Americans will attempt relocation. The bitter and the weak-hearted will refuse this opportunity.

Circumstances beyond our control may delay us in our endeavor to relocate, but we must not give up hope. The right opening may not be here at the present time for many of us, but we must not become slack. We must not become embittered because of successive disappointments in our attempts for resettlement. We dare not let discouragement lead us into despair.

Our future in America depends upon our actions today. The opportunity is before us and we must accept it now if we claim to be Americans. We have our share in the war effort ahead of us.

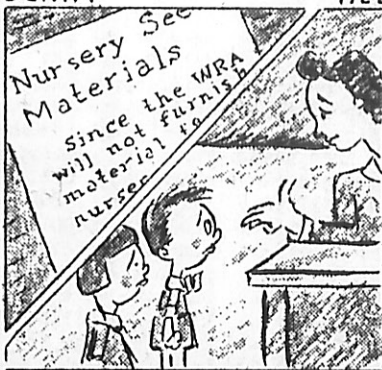

The recent freezing of evacuee job seekers to Cleveland, Ohio, makes us wonder if an equilibrium between workers and jobs has been reached in that city.

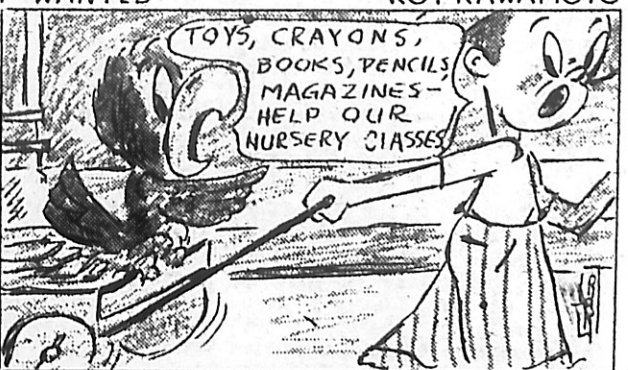
FAVORABLE REPORT

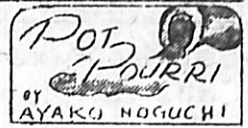

WAR TRAINING COURSES OFFERED IN DES MOINES

For those interested in taking part-time jobs and at the same time attend trade school free of charge, the Des Moines public school system is conducting a war training program financed by the Federal Government.

The training program includes courses in skilled trades with good wages.

They include machine operator training, acetylene welding and arc welding, structural sheet metal course, mechani-

cal drawing and precision measurement for inspectors.

Civilians are eligible for entrance into the U.S. Army Signal Corps training providing they secure Civil Service application blanks. The wages for this varies from \$1200 to \$1600 per year.

The foregoing classes with the exception of mechanical drawing and precision measurement for inspectors training operate on a 24-hour basis.

Absentee Voting, Registration Rules Explained

The following detailed statement regarding absentee voting and the procedure of registration for citizens formerly of California was released by the local Legal office:

"The laws of California require that a voter be registered before he may vote. A voter may be registered by mail if he is absent from the county at the time of registration. In order to do so he must get a registration affidavit from the county clerk, execute it and return it to the county clerk. Registration is permanent, but will be cancelled upon failure of the registrant to vote at the preceding primary or general election.

"To vote by absentee ballot the voter must apply in writing for a ballot. The application must be made to the county or city clerk, either in person or by mail, not more than 20 and not less than five days before election day. The absentee voter must take his ballot to a notary public or other officer qualified to administer oaths, mark it and sign and swear to the affidavit attached to the ballot.

The ballot and affidavit must then be mailed back to the clerk where they must be received within six days after the date of the election.

"These statutes make it clear that all American citizen evacuees from California, who are otherwise qualified to vote, may vote in their home precinct by absentee ballot if they are properly registered. If they voted in the general election in 1940, they are registered now unless their registration has been cancelled for some reason other than failure to vote, or unless they have moved from one voting precinct to another in California between that time and their evacuation and have failed to reregister. However, if they are not registered, they may do so by mail and be qualified to vote in the general election this year. If they are registered and fail to vote in one election this year, either the primary or general, their registration will be cancelled, and they will need to reregister before they can vote in 1944."

"The attitude of the War board is that any unused machinery which is needed by farmers will be requisitioned if sales are not consummated freely. Requisitioning will follow if the owners will not consent to the sale under the terms as offered in the War board letters.

"It is our opinion that requisitioning will apply principally to farm trucks, tractors and larger items of equipment which are in the greatest demand; that the smaller items will within all likelihood not be disturbed unless the demand for such equipment increases materially.

"In general, we have found in this office that it is quite difficult to dispose of small items of farm machinery such as spray rigs, cultivators, harrows, etc. The principal demand being for power equipment."
