Segregation Details Disclosed at Joint Meeting ENDUSTRIAL SECTION TO HANDLE FUEL PROJECT

In spite of the prevailing summer heat, the local wood program definitely got underway this week to out the estimated 9000 cords of wood needed to last through the winter, announced Assistant Project Director W.O. Helton.

The wood detail, which will be entirely handled this year by the newly-created Industrial section, will not interfere with agricultural work or any other Project operation, it was announced.

Made easily accessible by the recent of the Big opening Bayou bridge approximetely 600 to 800 agres of untouched timber some two and half miles east of the Project will be the source of the supply.

The area consists primarily of young oak and hickory comparatively smaller than trees out last winter, which is ex-pected to make the processing less diffigult.

Little interference with rain is expected during the next three and half months durwhich time the wood must be out. By starting now with up to 160 mon to be assigned in the next two weeks and more to be added later and with the addition of new equipment, the wood situation is expected to be solved without the anxiety and hardship experienced last winter.

Studying the wood problem and making inspections for the past month has been the Center joint advisory wood committee composed of Harold Ouchida, Kacru Kamikawa, Otoiohi Noma, Ken Iida, Kelly Arakawa and Koichi Kamikawa representing

Leaders of the repatriate group will also convene at a similar meeting in the near future, said Taylor.

Northern Colorado Area Now Closed to Evacuees

Because of the large numbers of evacuees in the Northern Colorado area including Donver, indefinite and short term leaves to that region have been cancelled for six months, according to Harold S. Choate, relocation supervisor, recently.

Counties affected are Denver, Adams, Weld, Boulder, Arapahoe, Jefferson, Larimer and Otero. The only exceptions will be cases where evacuees are joining immediate rela-

tives, it was said.

Scasonal leaves may still be obtained in the foregoing counties, but indefinite leaves will not be approved even though some may find year-around employment.

A BITTER LESSON

On Concentration

The recent freezing of indefinite leaves to Donver and the surrounding area should be a reminder to the evacues that congregation in any locality is unhealthy for the whole group. As has been pointed out by observers the very fact that the evacuees were concentrated in certain areas on the Pacific Coast made thom vulnerable to attack from race baiters.

As relocation progresses, resettlers would be wise in going to. localities other than those now being heavily populated with evacuees. Dispersion will make assimilation in American life easier for those concerned.

The tendency of resettlers to flook to large cities where there are large numbers of evacuees should be discouraged as detrimental to the future welfare of the evacuees. Large groups of any minority living in any city tend to accontuate the problem of assimilation by becoming so conspicuous in the public eye that its membersunconsciously create guspicions whether groundless or not.

Although it may be difficult for some to sever their relations with other evacuees by scattering throughout the country such resettlement will undoubtedly lead to the eventual benefit of all in greater assimilation.

On Wood Program

Those responsible for the planning of the woodcutting program announced in this leave of the THIBUM are to be commended for their foresight. Close collaboration on the part of the block managers, the Community Council and the administration resulted in the formulation of concrete steps to avoid the confusion which existed last winter regarding the wood situation.

Although other centers are supplied with coal or oil for heating barracks in the winter, this Center and Rohwer have been forced to depend upon firewood because of its availability in close proximity to the residential areas.

With a large percentage of the able-bodied population of the Center out on resettlement, there will be fewer workers available to process almost the same amount of fuel necessary for adequate warmth. Therefore, it is mandatory that Center residents cooperate in carrying out operations of the wood program. Failure to do so will lead to disruption of other Center activities and undue suffering to many.

SEGREGATION

Not Punishment

With further details on seg+ regation announced in this issue, perhaps, it would be wise to emphasize certain aspects of this program.

Separation of the disloyal from the loyal does not mean that the former will be punished when they are removed to one segregation center. It does mean the facilitation of the relocation program for those in the other centers.

Segregation logically should lead to more freedom for the loyal evacuees since whatever dangerous elements will Ahave been removed.



Being one of the three largest centers in the country and having the largest numbor of expatriates and repatriates were given as reasons for the selection of Tule Lake as the sogregation center. At the same time, ample agricultural facilities for a work program existed in Tule Lake.

The center also lies at the edge of an evacuated area.

All porsons transferred to the center will be entitled to have their cases reviewed under an appeals procedure while a local hearing board will also be established shortly with Project Attorney Lovell in charge.
