HOME PAPERS

Still Welcome But...

The old paper from back home is still a welcome article in many relocation center homes.

And so many evacuous continuo to subscribe to such imports as the Los Angeles Times just to keep abreast of things which are happening in their former home towns. It would be harmless if that was all there was to it, but these journals are almost daily recording resolutions and recommendations passed by various local groups against the release of ovacuous from the centers and against their return to the West Coast either during or after the war.

Since most of the Galifornia papers would be foolish in attempting to buck public opinion, they consistently follow the practice of publishing stories in opposition to the evacuees which has a simister and deleterious effect upon ovacues readers. Daily reading of such articles tend to distort the antagonism on the outside in the ovacuee mind, causing many to believe projudice against them is universal.

Evacues must realize that California newspapers represent only a small portion of the nation's press and that there are numerous Midwest and Bastern papers which have gone to bat for those of Japanese descent.

(Editorial note: Typical of the favorable stand on the resettlement program taken by the Cincinnati Post is the following which appeared in "Cincinnatus," a column by Alfred Segal, in the Aug. 11 issue.)

Cincinnatus can't go along with the American Legion (in convention here yesterday) which wants all Americans of Japanese ancestry sent had: to concentration camps.

The Legica, in resolutions, suggested that all people with Japanese blood in them were treacherous, and away with them. This is like Japanese saying that all Americans are gangsters, on account of Al Capone, and that all Americans should be looked up in Alcatraz.

Or is it like saying that since Nezis are awful people, all Americans of German descent should be locked up. Nobody ever thinks of being that absurd.

A number of Americans of Japanese descent are working here now. Cincinnatus hears that their employers speak well of their fidelity. Their fellow-workers, after being suspicious, have come to respect them. They see that Americans of Japanese descent do not differ from other Americans of the rany races that make up America.

HOUSING

Biggest Worry

The emphasis in the relocation program to date has been on omployment and little has been done along housing lines. And this has been the toughest problem for most evacuoes instead of employment because the manpower shortage has opened up a number of fields.

Better results in the releastion effort might be obtained if relecation officers in the various cities concentrated on housing a little.

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
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
