**MIXED MARRIAGE
COUPLES LEAVE POSTON
UNDER SPECIAL PERMITS**

Southern California and Orange County officials today had been informed by Project Director W. Wade Head that a number of evacuees, most of them husbands or wives of mixed marriages, have been permitted to leave Poston under special permits signed by proper officers of the Fourth Army Command.

Director Head's statement, issued to Los Angeles newspapers and the Associated Press, followed an investigation by Sheriff Elliott of Orange County after reports had reached the sheriff's office that a Japanese woman and her child had returned to the county accompanied by her Caucasian husband. A Los Angeles morning newspaper under date of Friday, September 4, reported that Elliott had immediately gone into conference with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

In behalf of the Fourth Army Command, the Wartime Civilian Control Administration under Lt. Col. Karl Bendetsen is in charge of the issuance of permits for mixed marriage couples. These permits are issued upon the recommendation of Project Director Head.

His new assignment will carry him to Arkansas where he has been promoted to commissary chief for two 10,000 population projects which will soon house many evacuees from Santa Anita Assembly Center.

TRAFFIC ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF POSTON

Chapter 2 (Operation, Use of Vehicles, Cont'd)

Section 3. Hand Signals
All signals herein required given by hand and arm shall be given from the left side of a vehicle in the following manner and such signals shall indicate as follows:

a. Left turn---hand and arm extended horizontally beyond the side of the vehicle.

b. Right turn---hand and arm extended upward beyond the side of the vehicle.

c. Stop or sudden decrease of speed signal---hand and arm extended downward beyond the side of the vehicle.

Section 4. Any motor vehicle assigned to the transportation of people and actually engaged therein shall have in addition to the driver one assistant, and the driver thereof shall observe the following regulations:

a. Shall not permit more than two persons in addition to the driver in the front seat.

b. Shall not permit any person to ride on running board, fender, top of cab or canvas-covered canopy. Exception as to garbage and fire trucks.

c. Shall not transport more than the number of passengers designated by the Transportation Office.

d. Shall not permit any person to stand on the drop gate of the back of the vehicle when such vehicle is in motion.

e. The driver shall not start the vehicle in motion until notified by his assistant.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any vehicle to be parked within twenty feet of any fire plug, building, or
