Twenty-four persons appeared in court at Poston I Police Dept. on charges of traffic violations here at the Center. The cases co-ver the ten-day period; from Aug. 27 to Sept. 7, according to the court books.

The charges varied fromspeeding to riding passengers on the drop-gates and running boards. Most of the violators are on probation of one to six months. Few were confined to the City Jail for two days with one day suspended in addition to the given probation.

POSTON III DI SPUTE TO GO BEFORE COURT

The dispute over personal differences between George Fukushima, defendant, and S. Ota; J. Ota and T. Shimizu, complaintants, will be given a jury trial at Poston I this coming week, it was announced yesterday.

The jury will be selected by the City Councilmen of Poston I, while a judicial commission of three qualified men will act as judges. The contestants in the court will be allowed to choose their respective attorneys.

The case, first to come up from Poston III, should be of interest to the public as it affords an opportunity to see law and order enforced in a democratic manner.

Poston III will have its own court and judicial commission as soon as organization plans are completed, it was revealed by the administration.

ALL OUT FOR FIRE CENTION

Today we have before, us an opportunity to experience in a very real; and personal way one of the fundamental tenets of the democratic process—the right of the people to elect a people's representative.

The importance of an all-out election stands clear. Upon the extent of our participation in today's election will rest the proof of our conviction in the ultimate necessity of a democratic government to sustain for a free people a free world.


