ATTEMPT TO OUST FORMER POSTONIANS FROM PARK COLLEGE, MISSOURI, BY PARKSVILLE CITIZENS FAILS; "EVERYTHING'S OKAY" SAYS NISEIS

In a letter received here, Poston friends of Arthur Kamitsuka, Abraham H. Dohi and Henry Masuda, Unit 2 scholars of Park college in Missouri and who were the central figures in a discriminating controversy begun by citizens of the Parkville township, were re-assured that they will continue with their education at the institution and that they are not neglected, nor ignored and have the 100% backing of the college faculty and student body.

In a 6-inch, 2 col. spread in the Sept. 7th edition of the Los Angeles Examiner which featured an AP wirephoto of the 7 Nisei students now present at Park, it was stated that the "citizens' opposition (to Japanese students) failed."

Both the Pacific Citizen and the influential Kansas City Times devoted approximately two columns each to the story, decrying the efforts of Mayor Harbert A. Dyer and members of the Parkville chapters of the American Legion and American War Mothers to oust the Japanese American students.

Dr. William Lindsay Young, president of Park college, took up the hatchet in behalf of the Niseis to a successful conclusion. Quoting the K.C. Times in its Aug. 25th issue, "Given generally to the soft-spoken word, Dr. Young struck vigorously against those who, he said, "apparently have lost sight of exactly those things for which this nation is now fighting."

POSTON THREE GOES TO POLLS

An estimated 2,200 voters will go to the polls today in ten blocks to elect representatives to Poston III's Temporary Community Council.

Thirty-six candidates will be running for offices in what promises to be a lively and exciting election, as interest is declared to be unusually high. Each of the respective blk. mgrs. are expected to exert all possible efforts to chalk up the highest voting percentage, and the records established in Poston I and Poston II stands threatened to fall.

For the remaining six occupied blocks not voting in this election due to their later arrival, arrangements will be made for a similar election shortly.

POSTON III RESIDENTS MAY MOVE TO I OR II

New arrivals in Poston 3 may move to Poston 1 or 2 providing families moving out do not occupy apartments now empty, but instead move in with relatives or friends, according to a statement from Housing Registration.

ATTENTION POSTON VOTERS

All California residents of Poston, who wish to vote in their respective counties may do so by writing to the County Clerk's office or the Office of the Registrar of their residence prior to evacuation for an Affidavit of Registration in duplicate according to the Legal Dept. of Poston 1.

Those who may apply for registration are: (1) Anyone who has lost his voting rights by failing to vote; (2) did not register in the past or (3) will become 21 years of age by November 3.

mediate area, Dr. Young-asked,.....Nothing has been said about this group (Americans of German ancestry.) Is an American-born Japanese any worse than an American-born German according to our way of life? Or is war hysteria making us lose sight of our democratic ideals and the priceless guarantee that all Americans are free, equal and to have the same opportunities?"

The KC Times featured the article with a 5-inch, 3 col. cut, picturing the 3 lads in their dorm. A Times writer wrote, "Altho' all the boys speak Japanese, they speak English better and they speak it as do other Americans with the slang and idioms that few Englishmen and no native Japanese seem ever to accomplish gracefully."

In their letters, the 3 Niseis wished it to be known to all future college entrants and the residents here that "everything's o-kay" and was as Dr. Young labeled the discriminating citizens' movement, "a tempest in a teapot."

TRAFFIC VIOLATORS GET JAIL SENTENCE; PROBATION PERIOD

Twenty-four persons appeared in court at Poston I Police Dept. on charges of traffic violations here at the Center. The cases cover the ten-day period, from Aug. 27 to Sept. 7, according to the court books.

The charges varied from speeding to riding passengers on the drop-gates and running boards. Most of the violators are on probation of one to six months. Few were confined to the City Jail for two days with one day suspended in addition to the given probation.

POSTON III DISPUTE TO GO BEFORE COURT

The dispute over personal differences between George Fukushima, defendant, and S. Ota; J. Ota and T. Shimizu, complainants, will be given a jury trial at Poston I this coming week, it was announced yesterday.

The jury will be selected by the City Councilmen of Poston I, while a judicial commission of three qualified men will act as judges. The contestants in the court will be allowed to choose their respective attorneys.

The case, first to come up from Poston III, should be of interest to the public as it affords an opportunity to see law and order enforced in a democratic manner.

Poston III will have its own court and judicial commission as soon as organization plans are completed, it was revealed by the administration.

NEW PRINCIPAL HERE

Dr. Arthur L. Harris, formerly an assistant superintendent of Honolulu schools, has arrived to become principal of secondary schools.

Doing administrative work in Honolulu since 1927, Dr. Harris, since 1940, was enrolled at Yale University taking Ph.D. and teaching Fellowship. His wife and three boys are expected to join him here as soon as he is settled to his new position.

ALL OUT FOR ELECTION

Today we have before us an opportunity to experience in a very real and personal way one of the fundamental tenets of the democratic process--the right of the people to elect a people's representative.

To many this will not be the first experience, but to the Issei it will be a new and meaningful venture. To the Issei, for the first time, they will

have a share in the free selection of a democratic, representative self-government--an experience unknown under fascist tyranny.

The significance of today's election is not confined only to the inclusion of the new Issei electorate but has wider over-all implications. We are demonstrating here today that in a democracy a body of people, indicted allegedly for

lack of faith in democracy, can still test and answer this indictment with positive actions of their own.

The importance of an all-out election stands clear. Upon the extent of our participation in today's election will rest the proof of our conviction in the ultimate necessity of a democratic government to sustain for a free people a free world.

Moto's record as an Eagle Scout and scoutmaster, Sunday School departmental head and coordinator of recreations attests to his efficient, compelling leadership.

"My vocation," he concludes, "and my avocation are about the same."

The sparkling career of Poston III's youthful dance orchestra leader, HENRY KUBOTA, 17, began at 10 practicing on the tenor sax in Stockton.

After 2 years he switched to the clarinet with which he has become a Master.

Moving to Fresno in '38, he formed a dance band, playing until evacuating to Reedley. There again he started another band but was stopped by evacuation.

Undaunted, Kubota has again gathered swingsters around him for Poston III's 1st dance orchestra. Take a bow, Maestro Kubota. . .

He's 35 years old, 200 lbs. and stands 5 ft. 8 1/2 inches high. He's married and has three little boys. You guessed it. He's that likeable, dynamic personality, GEORGE E. FURUTA, employment manager of Poston III.

Prior to evacuation, he was employed at the Standard Acceptance Finance Co. and was also proprietor of a L.A. retail jewelry store. His hobbies are entertaining, amateur opera singing, and "raising kids." He's the talented performer whom you saw at the talent show doing that hilarious act of hula dancing and singing with his own "3 chord" accompaniment on the ukulele.

Regarding employment, Mr. Furuta stated, "It is my sincere hope that everyone here will soon find a job and be established in his preferred work for the betterment of the community."

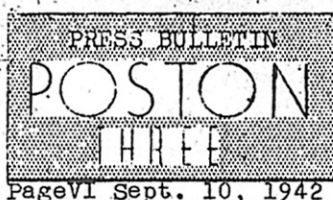
