REC. DEPARTMENTS TO BE RE-ORGANIZED

DR. JOHN POWELL HOPEFUL FOR "OUTSIDE" AID IN OBTAINING RECREATION EQUIPMENT, FUNDS

"While the respective recreation departments of Poston are still considering ways and means of acquiring funds and equipment, we are endeavoring to make "outside" contacts to alleviate our situation."

So stated Dr. John Powell, Community Activities and Welfare director, in an interview yesterday concerning the recreation program.

"Mrs. Paul Linson (co-op expert) has promised to contact a group of people when she returns back East to assist us as much as possible, while Mr. J. W. Shepherd (Chief Proprietary Acc't of Poston) is going to look into the matter of equipment and such while he is in San Francisco," were the words of Dr. Powell.

In regards to the availability of assistance from the WRA, Dr. Powell disclosed that some general supplies, such as paint, plywood and cloth for the use of all the rec. units will probably be apportioned.

A planning committee composed of representatives from each of the 3 Units will function until Oct. 1st to completely organize the Community Activities and Welfare program. James Hirokawa and John Gota will be the Poston 2 delegates.

With the resignation of John Gota as the head of the Unit 2 Rec. dept., Dr. Powell appointed J. Hirokawa to assume temporary leadership of the division. Gota is now reported to be affiliated with

OVER FOUR-FIFTH OF POSTON III VOTERS TURN OUT AT POLLS

The high average of an 83 per cent participation of all eligible voters of Poston III was recorded at Thursday's election for temporary City Councilmen, official figures showed.

Block 306 turned in the highest percentage with 98 per cent of its eligible voters, 226 out of 231, casting ballots. Another exceptionally large percentage of voters participating was observed at Block 317 where 94 per cent of the voters turned out at the polls. The least amount of interest was shown at Block 316 where 66 per cent voted.

The total number of ballots cast in all of Poston III was 1,799 out of 2,171 eligible voters.

At Friday's Block Managers meeting, a very favorable comment of the election was made by each Block Manager. In spite of the close competition as in Block 308 where Sam Rokutani edged out Kenny Murase by a ten-vote margin, the election went on smoothly. being undertaken thru the office of Charles Popkins, const. chief.

**PARKING LAWS RELEASED
BY POLICE DEPT.**

Parking Regulations as adopted by the Police Dept., Unit I, under Section 7 of the Traffic Ordinance, are being released today through the Bulletin:

1. No parking between buildings.
2. No parking within 75 feet of any intersection.
3. No parking within 75 feet of any canal bridge.
4. No parking within 100 feet of the Fire Station.
5. No parking within 50 feet of the Police Station.
6. No parking in front of the Administration Buildings.
7. No parking on the street adjacent to the Administration Buildings, except in the parking space provided.
8. No parking in front of the Hospital, except in the parking lot specified.
9. Parking on streets or highways limited to ten (10) minutes during daylight hours, exception loading and unloading, and only on the right-hand side of street or highway.

With the balloting Thursday of Unit 3 residents for their representatives to the temporary community council, the entire populace of Poston now face the challenging task of demonstrating, not so much their capabilities of participation in self-government, as in the degree of faith and conviction upheld in the democratic way of living as opposed to fascist theories.

It is a recognized fact that the unprecedented mass evacuation has had a severe psychological effect on many of us who were taught and came to appreciate the full implications of the Declaration of Independence and the Bill of Rights. We were told that the movement was essentially a matter of military necessity. And that compliance with the regulations may be construed as a test of loyalty, and our sacrifice comparable to the blood shed on the hot sands of North Africa, in the wooded areas of Bataan and on the wave-battered shores of Pearl Harbor by our fellow Americans.

So, now we face the test...can we take it?

To date, our actions, to voice the opinion of informed people, has been admirable. Now we are privileged to again offer proof of our undying faith in the democratic ideals for which American citizens of every nationality have given their lives in every corner of the hemisphere, including our own soil, where sanguinary battles have been fought.

The Poston community councils are the means whereby, you, the people, may express your collective selves. They will voice your opinions. The success or failure of our self-government will depend entirely upon your attitude. The councils are charged with numerous functions and responsibilities. But it shall be you, the people, who will dictate as to what shall be for the common good.

The Supreme Court of Florida asserts...The perpetuity of democracies has, as a foundation an informed, educated and intelligent citizenry.

Let us meet the challenge! Prove to one and all that our faith in the way of democracy is unshakable! That we, the people, shall reign supreme! That, in spite of apparent discrimination and prejudice, we have not lost sight of the fundamental tenets underlying our "mode of life".

ALL REC DONATIONS TO BE DISTRIBUTED IN THREE UNITS EQUALLY

At a staff meeting held by the Poston 2 Rec. Dept. Friday, Lloyd Urabe announced that any equipment or money received, whether from outside donations or allotted by the government, will be prorated to the depts. of Units 1, 2 and 3 on a populational basis. Urabe made the report on the basis of a conference held recently with the Rec. leaders of Poston 1 and 3.

John K. Yamauchi, Unit 2 entertainment committee chrmn, also reporting from the divisional conference, flatly asserted that, "Camp 2 showed the best organization and representation at the recreational leaders meeting."

Advocacy of Gov't aid in finances and equipment was stressed by the local rec. leaders, in view of the probable pecuniary conditions to be faced by the residents.
