## POSTON, 2 RESIDENT, AGED 55, DISAPPEARS

HEIKICHI NAGANUMA LAST SEEN HEADED FOR PARK SATURDAY MORNING; SEVERAL HUNDRED VOLUNTEERS IN SEARCHING PARTY; WOODED AREA HINDERS JOB

The strange disappearance of an elderly Poston 2 resident Saturday morning has resulted in several hundred fellow residents engaging in an investigation as to his whereabouts.

Heikichi Naganuma, 55 year old habitant of 227-3-C, was last seen at approximately 10 o'clock Saturday morning heading toward one of the numerous parks located in the immediate western outskirts of Block 227 in the wooded area. It had been a daily custom for him to exercise thusly, accompanied by his wife, having been an invalid for the past two years. However, it so happened that on this particular morning, Mr. Naganuma had ventured to make the short trek to the park alone. His non-appearance for lunch occasioned fears as to his safety, having been a victim of a paralysis, partially crippling his leg.

Due to the heavily wooded area and the vast expanse to cover, the searchers were, as the Bulletin went to press, finding their tireless efforts fruitless. Some of the hunters, all of whom were Poston 2 volunteers, have been searching unceasingly since his absence was noted.

Waiting courageously at home for Mr. Naganuma's return are his wife, two daughters, Mary and Taki, aged 20 and 17 respectively, and a son, Tommy, aged 13.

A late interview, 7 o'clock last nite; with James D. Crawford, Poston 2 administrator, disclosed that the investigation to that hour was not illuminating.

GOVERNOR HERBERT MAW of Utah this week suggested Army induction of Japanese American youths and their assignment "at military salaries" to work in western harvest fields.

Gov. Maw's proposal, an outgrowth of a meeting of a special committee which has been studying the Utah farm labor situation, was made in letters to Utah congressional leaders.

A REVISED PROCEDURE to make wartime evacuees of Japanese ancestry available for harvesting sugar beets & other crops in the intermountain region and the plain States was announced by Dillon S. Myer, Director of the WRA. Already some 1500 evacuees are at work in the beet fields of eastern Oregon, Idaho, Utah and Montana. may contact Administrator Crawford for further information.

IN AUGUST

For the month of Aug. 20,000 lbs. of coffee; 16,000 lbs. of ham; 308,400 lbs. of potatoes as well as a variety of fruits and vegetables have been allotted for the three Poston Units. The daily consumption of bread was 2,676 loaves and 6,000 quarts of milk, according to data received from L. Stultz, now Chief Steward here.

There is a direct milk delivery each morning right from the dairy, furnishing fresh products. Instead of unloading the milk to the reefers, it is loaded direct to the truck, then delivered to the messhalls.

Turnips and beets, with tops, raised by the evacuees in Tule Lake have been received. Spinach and peas are due from the same Center very shortly, Mr. Stultz declared.

Chester A. Potts, principal of Poston III schools, announced that preparations were under way to receive the Caucasian teaching personnel scheduled to arrive here shortly.

Living quarters are now being arranged in Blk. 324 for a contemplated staff of 25, to be augmented by Nisei personnel who have completed their teachers' training course.

School opening has been set for October 5, in classrooms located in Blk. 324.

# DEMOCRACY IN ACTION

Conditions in Poston admittedly are not of the best. In company with millions of fellow Americans, we are sacrificing much to prove beyond a shadow of a doubt a question solemnly recalled by Abe Lincoln in his immortal Gettysburg Address:.....Our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.....testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure.

But way back in the late Autumn of 1776, the colonists, too, were fighting a losing, sacrificial battle to preserve their principles as embodied in the then newly-accepted Declaration of Independence. For the colonists at the time were feeling low. The one organized force which they were able to muster was badly defeated in the Battle of Long Island. Consequently, there were those who felt the futility of continuing the struggle, that by the coming Spring, Washington's shattered force would be completely annihilated.

It was under such trying circumstances that one of the most sagacious statesmen in American history wrote:

If we give up our rights in this contest, a century to come will not restore us to the opinion of the world. We shall be stamped with the character of poltroons and fools. Present inconveniences are, therefore, to be borne with fortitude and better times expected.

That was Benjamin Franklin speaking, approximately 166 years ago. But therein lies our lesson for the day and the weeks to come.

Altho we are temporarily stationed in a relocation center, the American citizens of Japanese ancestry who participated in the primary elections, have found that their right of the franchise have not been infringed. Also, it has been determined that those citizen evacuees who have or will attain their majority by Nov. 3rd may register as voters for the coming general election.

One of our greatest concerns today is of the post-war era. It may well be within reason to conclude that the kind of men we may have sitting in our respective States' highest executive chairs may determine to some extent our future welfare. It may well be, too, that the new Governors' determination may be based not a little on our showing with the ballots.

For years the American citizens of Japanese extraction have been asking for a conclusive test of our loyalty to our Nation. If we had not been evacuated, it might have been easy to demonstrate our sincerity and faith in the democratic way of living. As it is, we have to proffer proof the hard way. The exercising of our rights to vote is one definite means whereby we may do so.

Are we to forfeit our rights so that a century to come will not restore us to the opinion

## SHOE REPAIRING EQUIPMENT DUE

The Board of Trustees of the Community Enterprise met Sept. 12 to set up the much-needed Shoe Repairing shop in Poston. About \$2500 worth of machinery, and \$4500 in shoe materials are expected to come here during the first part of October.

The price rates were made by the Enterprise, with the intention of lowering them, as soon as equipment is paid in full. Those have been asserted at the conference table: half soles-.75; half heel .30; whole heel-.35; sole and heel \$1.00; eyelets-.01; insoles-.15; minor repairs-.05 to .25; toe caps .35; heel plates-.05; Ladies half sole-1.00 to 1.25; sole and heel .65; heel-.15; sports whole heel-.35. Children's repair, half sole .40 to .50; heel-.15 to .25 up to size 5; cowboy boot heels-\$.40.

## FARMERS WORK HARD IN ATTEMPT TO SAVE CUCUMBER PLOT FROM PEST

Farmers' most dreaded enemy---plant pests, have made their initial appearance in the Center's truck crop which have been planted at the Fire Break areas in recent weeks. The first of these crops to be affected is the cucumber plot in Blk. 30; Nicotine dust is now being applied to control the aphids, which are now causing "slight damage" to the produce.

Due to the shortage in chemical supplies for pest control special effort is being made to check the spread with little loss.

## MORE PANTS, JACKETS, HATS ISSUED

The Clothing Dept., in operation since July 18 with Charles Takashima in charge, today announced the latest figures in its suanoe of clothing to persons in Poston 1.

Books show, as of Sept. 12, that 3042 persons have requisitioned for clothing to date; that 2401 hats, 2733 pants and 2615 jackets were handed out over the counter. Socks, T shirts and overcoats are in for requisition.

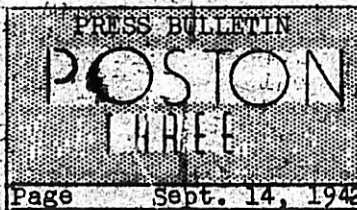
