## NEW SUBSISTENCE UNIT SET-UP

### BURDICK IN MOVE TO CLARIFY STATUS OF KITCHEN WORKERS

In an effort to clarify the titular status and duties of the working staffs of Poston 2's and 3's subsistence units, J. L. E. Burdick, Chief Steward of the two community units, has submitted a modified plan for approval by the Administration head concerned.

In a special interview granted the Poston 2 Press Bulletin bureau yesterday, Mr. Burdick stated that he expected an approximate increase of \$10,000 per month in the wage scale of the kitchen workers for the entire community with his new set-up, besides providing for a more efficient organization within the subsistence units.

With the need for able-bodied men for outside employment becoming greater day by day, Mr. Burdick has taken a long-range view of the mess hall situation. With the result that the absorption of women workers into the kitchen will be greatly facilitated and efficient service rendered to the community without discomfort and consistent with the public health of the residents.

Under the tentative plan, subsistence units feeding 260 or more will have one chef with 5 assistant cooks who will be paid on a PNT rating. Kitchens serving 210-260 will be provided with one chef and 4 aides, while

### SHOE REPAIR EQUIPMENT DUE WITHIN A WEEK, FISTER REPORTS

Three shoe repairing machineries, one for each unit were expected to arrive during the latter part of next week, according to information released here by Russell Fister, store director of the Enterprise who is buying the equipment from Los Angeles.

Mr. Fister, after making satisfactory contact with the Los Angeles dealer, asserted that small tools and sufficient repair supplies have been purchased to fix 10,000 pairs of shoes.

James Collier, a shoe repairman of ten years experience, now a resident of Poston 2, accompanied Mr. Fister on the trip.

RESIDENTS MAY INVITE VISITORS HERE ON PASS IS LATEST WRA RULING.

In a circular letter received here from the Acting Regional Director, E. M. Rowalt, of San Francisco, it was revealed that person or persons outside who wishes to visit Poston must come with passes issued by the Project Director, W. Wade Head, before entering the Center.

The regulations follow that all residents who are interested in having such visitors must apply for the "pass" at Ad. Bldg. III with Miss Betsy Nakashima who will fill out the proper forms. If the request is approved by W. Wade Head, the said "permit" will be mailed to the person or persons who is to make the visit.

The memo continues in regards to those eligible to enter the Relocation Centers. These are:

1. Non-Japanese persons married to a person of Japanese ancestry.
2. Non-Japanese parents of children of mixed blood.
3. Blood relatives of an evacuee family residing at the Center.

Just this week, it was a painful and yet joyous incident to bid farewell and good luck to two youthful Japanese Americans who left for Nebraska to continue their higher education. In this instance, we discover again that time is not the essence nor the determining factor of a lasting friendship. It was just a short 4 months ago that we became acquainted with this brother and sister couple. Previous to that we had bid adieu to a lad whom we hadn't known prior to our entrance to this Center. And yet, we have been enriched, spiritually and morally, by the experiences we have endured together, at play and at work, during our brief acquaintanceship here.

Today we can proudly boast of many new friends made since taking up our abode here. It has certainly mitigated the situation caused by the abnormal circumstances in a most pleasant manner. Frankness and complete trust in the natural kindness of human nature, be he of Caucasian or Occidental blood, great men or of obscure position, seldom fails.

True, we have crossed the paths of persons who seem to be motivated in their actions only for their self ego and, mayhap, individual profit. But to date, such have been the exceptions and we trust that in due time they shall see the error of their ways or else banished from the Center for the "good of the majority".

Let us put aside our personal ambitions for the time being and become imbued with the biblical thought: Do unto others as you would unto yourself. Only thusly can we maintain our faith in things human and face a "tough" post-war future with a clear conscience, with spiritual and moral strength and unashamed.

Napoleon once said that "spirit has always vanquished the sword". We shall need every ounce of our spirit to take our rightful part and participate in the battle for "peace on earth, good will toward all men".

# POSTON 2 JACL LEADERS "START BALL ROLLING" FOR OUTSIDE HELP

Through the earnest endeavors of local JACL leaders, Poston was enriched recently by the receipt of four more valuable books for the Community Activities division. Fusako Kodani, head of the girls activities unit of Poston 2, received the following books from Mrs. Elizabeth W. Hill of Pacific Grove, California: Girl Scout Handbook, Ice-breakers (a book on games and "breaking down" the "wall-flowers" to participate), Physical Education-Play Activities for Girls in Junior and Senior High School, and Recreation for Girls and Women.

Through the efforts of Saburo Kido, the National JACL headquarters had previously donated a number of books and pamphlets on girl scout work, with more expected soon on other phase of community activities.

In a letter received here from Mrs. Hill, she stated that she had made arrangements with Miss Parsons, formerly on the faculty of the Monterey Hi School and now of Salinas, the Pacific Grove hi school library, Mrs. Haasis of the Monterey County Medical staff, and Mrs. Brienig, Community Center of Monterey, to cooperate in getting a collection of games, books, handiwork equipment, magazines and mechanical toys to be sent to Poston.

in part:

"Such visits by authorized non-residents shall be limited to such terms as the Project Director feels it necessary to impose, including length and frequency of such visits.
