RESIDENTS MAY INVITE VISITORS HERE ON PASS IS LATEST WRA RULING.

In a circular lotter received here from the Acting Regional Director, E. M. Rowalt of Sin Francisco, it was revealed that person or persons outside who wishes to visit Poston must come with passes issued, by the Project Director, W. Wade Head, before entering the. Benter.

The rogulations follow that all residents who are interested in hoving such visitors. must apply for the. "pass" at Ad. Bldg.III with Niss Betsy Nakashims who will fill out the proper forms. If the request is approved by W. Wade Head, the said 'permit' will be mailed to the person or persons who is to make the visit.

The memo continues in regards to those eligible to enter the Relocation Centers. Those are:

1. Non-Japanese persons married to a person of Japanese ancestry.

2. Non-Japanese parents of children of mixed blood.

3. Blood relatives of an evacuee family residing the Center.

ENRICHED BY FRIENDSHIPS

IN HUMAN NATURE WE TRUST

"Parting is such sweet sorrow". A somewhat trite phrase? And yet, since our evacuation, practically everyone of us have undergone the heart-breaking, and oft-times tearful, experience of seeing our firmest friends, and yes, in many instances our own relatives, scattering hither and yon throughout the Nation.

Just this week, it was a painful and yet joyous incident to bid farewell and good luck to two youthful Japanese Americans who left for Nebraska to continue their higher education. In this instance, we discover again that time is not the essence nor the determining factor of a lasting friendship. It was just a short 4 months ago that we became acquainted with this brother and sister couple. Previous to that we had bid adieu to a lad whom we hadn't known prior to our entrance to this Center. And yet, we have been enriched, spiritually and morally, by the experiences we have endured together, at play and at work, during our brief acquaintanceship here.

Today we can proudly boast of many new friends made since taking up our abode here. It has certainly mitigated the situation caused by the abnormal circumstances in a most pleasant manner. Frankness and complete trust in the natural kindness of human nature, be he of Caucasian or Occidental blood, great men or of

obscure position, seldom fails.

True, we have crossed the paths of persons who seem to be motivated in their actions only for their self ego and, may hap, individual profit. But to date, such have been the exceptions and we trust that in due time they shall see the error of their ways or else banished from the Center for the Jgood of the majority".

Let us put aside our personal ambitions for the time being and become imbued with the biblical thought: Do unto others as you would unto yourself. Only thusly can we maintain our faith in things human and face a "tough" postwar future with a clear conscience, with spiritual and moral strength and unashamed.

Napoleon once said that "spirit has always vanquished the sword". We shall need every ounce of our spirit to take our rightful part and participate in the battle for "peace on earth, good will toward all men".
