MILLER TO HEAD POLICE DEPARTMENT

FORMER SAN FRANCISCAN STUDIED UNDER NATIONALLY
REKNOWN AUGUST VOLLMER AT BERKELEY TO ORGANIZE
TRAIN, SUPERVISE POSTON POLICE ACTIVITIES

COURT SESSIONS IN
POSTON I HELD TWICE
WEEKLY

Ernest L. Miller, recommended highly by August Vollmer, nationally reknown police authority and instructor of Berkeley, California, arrived in Poston Thursday to take over his duties as the Chief of Internal Security.

A strapping six-footer from San Francisco, Chief Miller hopes to accomplish the two purposes which he has in mind in regards to his duties, namely: (1) to create professional standards of efficiency in the Poston police program so that the residents will be assured of equal and fair consideration and treatment; and (2) to create conditions which will make police work as interesting and educational as possible. To carry out this 2-point program, Chief Miller will organize, train and supervise the police activities of the 3 units "not necessarily changing the present program" and standardizing the system of the 3 depts.

Mr. Miller majored in police administration under Vollmer at University of California, having studied 5 years there. During 1936, Mr. Miller traveled all over Europe for 7 months on research work in policing. For the past four years, he has been affiliated with the San Francisco police force, first as a patrolman in a radio car, and the last 2 years as personnel officer in charge of recruit training.

"I hope we will be able to set up a very thoro training program for all the men who are interested in police work at Poston,"

stated Mr. Miller. "I am certain that the police agencies that now exist will cooperate wholeheartedly, and I will cooperate in turn in working out the problems that may confront them."

Court sessions by the temporary Judicial Dept. of Poston I are held twice weekly, Mon. and Thurs. at 10:00 a.m. at the City Jail. Trial for 5 traffic violators and probation violators was passed sentence by the presiding officers, Chief Justice S. Nomura, Judges Geo. J. Fujii and Harry Ogawa. Forty-four cases have been tried since August 27.

SCOUTING IN POSTON

ADDITIONS TO CODE OF
OFFENSE, ADOPTED BY
T.C.C., SEPT. 30

Sec. 43. Trespass. Every person who willfully commits any trespass by entering any lands under cultivation or who maliciously injures or destroys any standing crops, grains, vegetables, or fruits in the community of Poston is guilty of an offense, and upon conviction thereof is punishable by imprisonment in the city jail for a term not exceeding 90 days.

Sec. 44. Private Enterprises. No person, firm, corporation, association, or organization shall engage in private enterprises unless a written permit shall have been issued for such enterprises by T. C.C.; for the sale of consumer goods or services to any person or organization within the community of Poston for private profit. Any violation of this section shall constitute an offense and is punishable by imprisonment in the city jail for a term not exceeding 180 days.

All organizations interested in operating concession booths must apply for a permit from the City Council, to engage in any business. Exceptions shall be made for all organizations participating in the County Fair.

Let's turn back the pages of history to the 5th century. Our scene is laid in a forest in what is now a corner of London. Here a powerful Knight, clad in his symbolic armor and armed with his lance, rode through the woods, astride his war horse, equally protected by armored trappings. Behind him came his gallant band, alert and ready.

A sudden scream of a woman in trouble rent the air. Instantly, the Knight and his band spurred his trusty horse into action and was soon disposing of the woman's captor with his razor-sharp sword. In the meanwhile, his men had taken care of the other bandits. The frightened woman was restored to her fireside.... and the Knight and his band traveled on.

Such was the spirit of these Knights of old. A Good Turn to someone was their daily practice.

Flipping the leaves of history forward to February 8, 1909, we find ourselves still in London. But the great city by the rolling Thames River is enveloped by a thick, "pea-soup" fog. Traffic and pedestrians are cautiously and carefully ambulating around. Street Lights had been ordered on before noon. And now night was coming on.

In the midst of this blanketing fog William D. Boyce, Chicago publisher and traveler, is seeking a difficult address. A boy approached him and asked, "May I be of service to you?" Mr. Boyce told the lad where he wanted to go. The boy saluted and said, "Come with me, sir," and forthwith led him to the desired destination. Like the typical American tourist, Mr. Boyce offered a shilling. But the boy promptly replied, "No, Sir, I am a Scout. Scouts do not accept tips for courtesies." The Chicagoan murmured in surprise, and after completing his errand, was led to the office of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the British Boy Scout Association.

On February 8, 1910, Mr. Boyce and others interested in the welfare of boys formally organized the Boy Scouts of America. Thus in brief is repeated the oft-quoted story of the beginning of the BSA movement.

In Poston, we are privileged to have a large group of former scouts and interested residents. Already, the groundwork has been laid for a sturdy scouting program. We cannot too often stress the importance of cooperating wholeheartedly with this movement. The welfare of our children is naturally the concern of every parent in the center. We must not overlook this valuable source of life at any cost.

The scoutmasters and committeemen of Poston seem to radiate sincerity and integrity, perseverance and sense of responsibility. They are all voluntary workers and giving of their time and effort only because they are aware of the benefits that boys may accrue from a scout-

In an effort to remedy a complaint that they were insufficiently provided with staple food, the Parker warehouse crew of 40 from Poston 2 met with Vernon Kennedy, Chief of the employment bureau, yesterday afternoon in the Press building east of the Unit 1 postoffice.

Headed by their spokesman and warehouse supervisor of Poston 2, Henry Fujii, the workers requested that steps be taken as quickly as possible to correct the food situation and other irritating conditions.

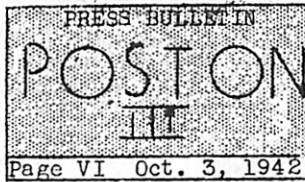
REQUISITIONS DUE

**OCCUPANTS WITH FAUCETS
IN BARRACKS MUST MEET
SANITATION REGULATIONS**

Occupants having faucets within their barracks were requested by the Division of Sanitation, Public Health Dept., to observe the following regulations: 1-All forms of laundry, and dish washing prohibited; 2-Morning and evening toilet within the barrack, such as brushing teeth, washing face, etc., is prohibited; this is permitted only in the latrine; 3-The receptacle, such as a bucket, to collect the water underneath the faucet and the waste water must be disposed of in the latrine; when bathing is necessitated by the aged or by infants, the used water must be disposed of in the latrine.
