RESIDENTS MAY APPLY FOR PERMIT TO VISIT RELATIVES, FIANCEE, IN OTHER CENTERS

Project Director W. Wade Head has received authority to issue visiting permits to Poston residents who may desire to visit relatives, close friend or a fiancee in other relocation centers. This authority was extended to Director Head by a WRA Administrative directive number 46 signed by WRA Director D. S. Myer.

Residents may receive such authorization for the following purposes: (1) To attend the funeral of a member of the immediate family; (2) To visit a close relative who is ill when, in the opinion of the attending physician, it will have a beneficial effect upon the patient; and, (3) To visit a close friend or fiancee.

The transportation costs of the visits under sections (1) and (2) will be assumed by the Government only if the separation of the family members was involuntary. Expenses of travel under section (3) must be borne by the evacuee.

Authorization for the visit may be given by Director Head after checking with the Project Director of the Center to be visited.

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"OUTSIDE" DOMESTIC JOBS NEED POSTONIANS AS EMPLOYEES, REPORT

Eighty dollars a month with room and board is offered to the couple, the man for chauffeur and gen'l work, and lady for housekeeping, by the employer who is Gov. Official at Wash. As it is very urgent, two or three applications are wanted to be sent via airmail within this week. Those interested are asked to go to their Employ. All wishing to take a post-graduate course in any ~~subject~~ subject (such as Commercial), Dr. M. Cary, Ed. Director, reported today that they may write a note of request to Dr. J. Powell Adult Ed. and Rec. Director, or to him. If enough response is seen, in any particular course, the Ed. Dept. is expecting to hold such classes.

MORE BEET WORKERS NEEDED DECLARES BONACK

Contracts for harvest work are in from four companies, and Miss Mary Bonack, Regional Director of Employment declares that this will probably be the last chance this year for workers to be called out of state for workers in sugar beets and other harvest work. They are interested in large groups and families with view for possibility of future work in the springtime.

Greatwestern Sugar Co., needs more worker in Colorado and Nebraska. Utah-Idaho Sugar Co., needs more workers from here although several hundred already have answered the call and gone from Manzanar. Holly Sugar Co. has work in Wyoming in Platt River Valley and also in Montana. The American Crystal Co. has brought here pictures of the farms in Montana where they need workers.

Although the above contracts are for out of state, there will be jobs open in long-staple cotton picking here in Arizona. However, all those interested should apply to their respective Employ. offices and be placed on the "waiting list," advised Miss Bonack.

DIPHTHERIA INOCULATION TO BE GIVEN SCHOOL CHILDREN SOON

According to Dr. G. Kawaichi, all children will be given physical examination after the beginning of school, and arrangements for diphtheria inoculations for every child, 6 months to 12 years will be made at the same time. Two inoculations on Diphtheria, each a week apart are scheduled.

Though adults usually are immune to the disease, Schick tests may later be followed in the program, to determine their "susceptibility," Dr. Kawaichi said.

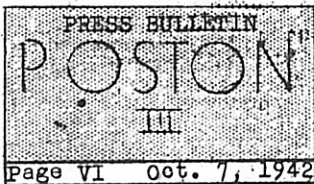
Those who have already taken their first diphtheria shot will be given their second shot Wed. Oct. 14, 1:00 to 4:00 p.m.
