## CONSTRUCTION FIRM REPORTS LOSS OF LUMBER

Mr. Harris, superintendent of construction for the Webb Construction Company Tuesday reported the loss of \$500 worth of lumber from the area south of Block 216 to Administrator James D. Crawford.

In making the report, Mr. Harris apprehended and turned in to the Unit 2 Police Department 4 youths, whose names are withheld because of their age, alleged to have been in the vicinity of the lumber piles and, according to the complainant, as the guilty parties.

The lads vehemently denied the accusations and are presently released by the Police Department on signature bonds.

## UNEXPECTED VISITORS INVESTIGATE PRESS

The industriously working Poston III P.B. staff was abruptly shaken to attention the other morning when a large Senior Core study group led by Mrs. Flynn trooped into the outer office. The object of their quest being to obtain general information about the paper, the interested students fired numerous questions at City Editor Isao Fukuda. After taking notes on his impromptu talk, they were cordially invited to observe the dummy making and stencil cutting. The visitors' plan was to visit all departments in this center.

## REPRESENTATIVES TAKE COTTON-FIELD TOUR

A sight-seeing tour over the 300 acres of cotton fields, which are awaiting harvest work by Postonians, was taken Tuesday by a group of men from the Center--V. R. Kennedy, chief of employment, Ed Takahashi, labor delegate from unit 3, and Y. Hiraoka, unit 1, both an experienced cotton workers. A Press Bulletin reporter also was "at the scene."

The fields, located about 4 to 6 miles out of Poston, scattered in 50 to 100 acre plot belong to different farmers. The visitors inspected the cotton-gins, chatted with the owners of the fields, and enjoyed a cold drink at the little community store called the Colo. River Trading Co., where hospitable clerks welcomed them.

## PAYCHECKS ARRIVE IN POSTON III

The residents of Poston III will be pleasantly surprised this morning to discover that they are actually going to be paid with Section I residents getting their first paychecks today.

Section I, including blks. 305--310, inclusive, will get their checks at the 306 blk. manager's office today starting at 8:15 a.m.

Section II, blks. 316, 317, 318, 325, 326, 327, will get paid tomorrow at 317 blk. manager's office commencing at 8:15 a.m.

Section III, blks. 322, 323, 324, 328, 329, 330, will be paid at blk. manager's office at 323, Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to noon.

Payees are warned to get their checks on the specified dates; otherwise, their pay may be delayed for another month.

The farmers, T.R. O' Hair and H.W. Bonds, who made possible the unique tour explained that "it is very easy for a woman to pick the long-stapled cotton because only three fingers are needed while one would have to use five fingers to pick the short-staples. Volunteer cotton pickers are now being taken at the employment offices, in the three units. Compensations are paid to each worker in accordance with the plans set up by representatives of Poston 1, 2 and 3 in a meeting held Monday afternoon at Unit 2.

The top W.R.A. scale of \$19 is received, with the remainder distributed in the Trust Fund, which later will be returned to the members of the Work Corps.

**BASEBALL FIELD TO BE LEFT FOR USE IN POSTON III**

Baseball diamonds on the townsite of Poston III will not be used for agricultural production at present as only 25 acres will be placed under cultivation until ditch irrigation water reaches this unit, it was assured sports enthusiasts in a statement from the administration.

Land north and south of the townsite will be available by the time the ditch water can be used here, it was added, and indications were that townsite areas now used for recreational purposes would not have to be taken up for cultivation, although people may desire to have vegetable gardens near their blocks in the future.

## PRESS REACHES MILESTONE

This issue marks a turning point in the history of the daily press Bulletin. With door to door delivery beginning today, the center newspaper will now reach the people because of their splendid support in the staff's effort to make its publication more than a mere organ for informing block managers of administration and departmental bulletins.

This issue is a big step towards turning the Press Bulletin into a newspaper of the people, carrying news about them and expressing their wishes whenever necessary.

The cooperation and backing of the people was essential in helping to bring about this change, but their cooperation must not cease here. There are innumerable future obstacles to be overcome before complete recognition can be gained without as well as within the relocation center.

An immediate problem to be faced is the difficulty of securing adequate machinery, type, paper and many other material necessary for the publication of a daily paper with a circulation of over a thousand. Plans calling for the installation of a job printing press, a linotype, teletype and U.P. services are in the process of being obtained piece by piece. Full equipment is expected to be assembled in the coming weeks. In spite of everything, however, the Poston Press Bulletin hopes to become the first center newspaper to be printed within the project.

Another advantage effected--now that the paper has been placed on subscription basis--is that advertisers will be attracted to our pages, and printing expenses are likely to be met by advertisement profits alone.

A milestone has truly been covered with the establishment of the press on a profit functioning basis. It will stand as a record of what can be achieved when the people get behind a worth while venture.

### WESTERN SUGAR CO., REPRESENT. SPEAKS ON BEET WORKS PROJECT

"One thousand men can be used at the present time," said Wm. C. McCarthy, Field Rep. of Great Western Sugar Co., in a meeting held at Mess 36, Oct. 13, to secure labor for best fields of Nebr., Colo. and Wyo.

"Although 5500 men have been sent out from various centers already, 1000 more can be used, for the harvest, which began Oct. 5, and will probably end about Nov. 15.

Transportation and meals to and from Centers are to be paid. The individual contracts are to stipulate living conditions. Civil Police protection "is assured" workers by Governors and County Representatives. Prevailing wage is to be paid.

At the expiration of the period stated in the contract, 30 days are granted in which the worker may find another job, except in Wyoming.

The Employment Office has been taking applications for jobs.

## POSTON 2 AG DEPARTMENT PREPARING FOR EXHIBIT AT THE COUNTY FAIR

Unit 2's agriculture department is busily engaged in assembling an exhibit for the County Fair which takes place this weekend.

A miniature plan showing a future model block is being prepared by the nursery division. The typical block will have sprawling lawns, shaded playgrounds and vegetable plots. Evergreen trees will border the block in the plan.

Specimens of vegetables raised in Unit 2, most of the Japanese variety, beehives, petrified rocks, several species of snakes will be displayed and also other oddities which will be exhibited from the Agriculture department here.

## An Open Letter ...

To the Residents of Poston 2, an apology is tendered: an explanation is made.

When I arrived in Poston as assistant to the Project Chief Steward, my interest was attracted by an opportunity to assist little children. Learning that the adobe school buildings would not be erected this year and that a residential block in Unit 2 and 3 would be set aside for temporary schools, I conceived the quaint idea of obtaining the use of the dining hall in the temporary school block so that mothers of the children might prepare and serve lunch to their little ones near to the class rooms. The Project Chief Steward, Mr. Stultz, was so favorable to the idea that he offered to have rations set aside from each block kitchens for these lunches. Also, a small sum was arranged for the special purchase of certain foods considered beneficial to small children which are not available in the regular Dining halls.

I endeavored to have the block managers in Poston 2 explain this to all the people. The Supervisor of Block Managers, Mr. George Nagan did not consider this idea favorably. A luncheon was given in Kitchen 210 for representative women from each block to consider a tentative arrangement. Two blocks sent no representatives. Those who attended asked for time to consider. It was agreed that those present should explain the plan to all parents in Unit 2.

On Saturday, October 10, I was shocked to find that instead of 300 women meet in Kitchen 210 for further discussion, only 31 women attended. By a majority vote the plan was vetoed.

I apologized for my intrusion into the family mode of life, but if an opportunity is offered, I will be glad to help the little children. (This plan was originated by myself and none other may be blamed for its unfavorable reception.)

Dr. Pressman, Dr. Togasaki, Mr. Stultz, Mr. M. K. Palmer, Sally Lucas Jean and Mr. Crawford and Mr. McLaren gladly offered assistance. To them I also apologize for taking valuable time.

## FIRE REGULATIONS CLARIFIED

Mr. Finn, fire dept. chief in Poston, in his talk to the Unit III block managers Tuesday, announced that materials of combustible nature may not be used for roofs of shades. Explaining his statement in detail, he specified that limbs, not brush, of diameter not less than 1 1/2", may be used. A coating of mud, to be dampened daily, was suggested by residents of Poston I. Shades should not exceed 40' in length and 30' in width, and should not be constructed near a hydrant.

Loose straw should not be kept in buildings, said Finn. Plans for kitchen improvements, look-out towers, and fire alarm system were also disclosed.

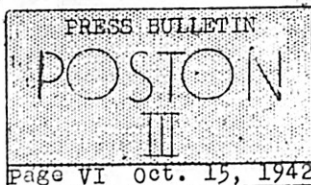

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### POSTON FAIR TO BE HELD AS SCHEDULED DESPITE CHANGE IN FAIRGROUND SITE

THE POSTON COUNTY FAIR WILL POSITIVELY BE HELD TOMORROW AND SUNDAY BUT THE FAIRGROUNDS HAVE BEEN ONCE AGAIN MOVED, THIS TIME FROM THE NEW factory south of Poston 1 to the main firebreak area immediately adjacent to the adobe shelter. All events will be held as scheduled!

This announcement was made at 4:30 p.m. yesterday by Saburo Kido, general director of the 1942 Fair, after Project officials had vainly sought for nine hours to straighten out a last-minute technical difficulty over the use of the garnishing net buildings.

The dilemma arose after the area engineer assigned to the project informed the administration: 1-That the Callowell Construction Co., factory contractors, have a fire and property loss insurance policy which is maintained only when the buildings are under their jurisdiction; 2-That the area engineer offices in San Diego had given a last-minute decree that this policy would not provide coverage for the building during the Fair occupancy; 3-That therefore, the WRA must assume full responsibility for any possible loss.

In view of the fact that neither the Project Administration nor WRA, San Francisco and Washington, D.C., has any power to accept such responsibilities over buildings not under their control. What had seemed to be

a minor dispute at noon yesterday reached a deadlock late in the afternoon.

Previously, a high ranking officer in the U.S. Engineers office, Washington, D.C., had given approval to the Fair project and its site at the factory. This approval, it appeared last night, had not been communicated to either the area or regional engineers' offices.

Nevertheless, THE FAIR WILL GO ON! More than 500 workers representing all major groups as well as concessionaires and exhibitors will be on hand today to rush completion of the Fair structures.
