1. That the voluntaevacuee labor be paid the top W.R.A. scale wage of \$19 a month and the balance be put into Poston 2's trust fund to be dispersed by a board of trustees for workers of Unit 2 in cash or to benefit purchases workers directly or indirectly.

2. That the wage scale of 50¢ per hour be paid the workers by the growers.

That transportation and compensation be provided bhe workers.

George Ono. executive secretary of Unit 2's Fair Employment Practice went to Park-. Friday morning to meet Mr. Dudley, one of the growers with V. Kennedy and a busload Issei experts to study the conditions of the cotton fields. Ono went primarily to negotiate and discuss the possibility of getting 50¢ per hour wage scale for evacuee labor.




