

to the great Due scarcity of trained men today, Miller has asked all intelligent, physically capable young men who are interested in the work, to go to him in Poston II, ad building I. The eventual plan is to have a force of 160 men for the three 11nits; all to be given modern training in criminal law, the laws of arrest, first aid, police patrol, abnormal psychology, self de-fense, military drill and discipline, etc. Six investigators with specialized training in finger printing, hand writing analysis, etc. will be chosen from the ranks of po-licemen for their excellency of training record.

In answer to an inquiry, Miller stated that there is no definite boundary around poston at present, but that plans are now be-ing made to set one. He assured, however, that the line will be many miles outside of the edge of camp, the western limit probably being the river. Miller also clarified the duties of the M.P. is. He explained that they have no jurisdiction whatever inside of this project, and that their only purpose is to patrol the peri-meter to keep out people who could come in and cause trouble.
