EMPLOYMENT SET-UP POLICY RELEASED BY LABOR COMMITTEE

To quell unwelcoming rumors concerning the new employment policy now being followed in Unit 1, the Labor Relations Committee disclosed to the Press today that "it is absolutely not responsible for those unfounded rumors," that we must have full confidence in the integrity of the Central Executive Board," and the L. R. Committee itself.

Following points have been stressed; (1) all re-employment are on a temporary basis; (2) all employment practices of hiring and dismissing workers in some depts. are on the basis of the Ad. point of view; and (3) in the future, all labor policies will be negotiated by this Comt., and if favorable to the People, the recommendations will be made to the Central Exe. Bd. for action.

"This Committee is created to act as the clearing house to receive all complaints, plans, or new improvements for the Community welfare," declared M. Mitani, exec. Sec'y of the organization.

SUBSISTENCE DEDUCTION

According to an official memo to Project Director Wade Head from Regional WRA Director E.R. Fryer, subsistence deduction for each worker in the net garnishing factory is \$25 per month, or if not employed a full month, \$6 per week or any portion of a week.

If the industry is accepted by the work corps, each employe of factory shall further be required to submit to the Social Security deductions and clothing allowances for himself and his dependent must be taken from his earned income.

She asks for an explanation as to our printing the news. And she further stated that Mrs. Tanda was never the block manager.

As a matter of fact, Mrs. Tanda was officially the block manager for 2 days. Whether she stepped inside her office or not was her business and not for us to ask. If this huffed young lady had read the story correctly, she might have discovered that we were only quoting Mr. Crawford's

And we pray to God that these prevailing rumors of another strike are just that—rumors. But we merely wished to point out the sort of stories making the rounds and we firmly believe the residents of that Unit should put the brakes on it.

Such rumors merely tend to undermine the morale of the people. We are now getting our quota of stoves, mattresses and linoleums. The statistics gathered and all preliminary procedures have been followed for the payment of the cash clothing allowances. The Administration seems to be making sincere efforts to speed up the monthly cash advancements.

All in all, things could be a d...m sight worse, as was expressed the other day by a bright-looking Poston Hi school lad who was contentedly munching away a chocolate-(and the real stuff!) coated ice cream bar.

Henceforth the residents should conduct themselves as befitting their cultural background. Propaganda upon propaganda are being turned out by the reams, concerning the brutality and "barbaric tendencies" of the Japanese. And we who are descendants of the race know that such stories are categorically untrue.

Japanese can contribute materially and spiritually to a finer, greater civilization. But we must realize that the only way by which we are able to prove our true cultural fineness and upbringing, the true character of the Japanese, is by our actions TODAY.

allowed to work in such an industry.

Mr. Maeno revealed that the present wages for the work were based on \$4.80 per 1000 square feet and/or 60¢ an hour. It was estimated that in Poston II alone, an approximate total income in wages of \$33,000 monthly may be realized. Of which, if the trust fund plan is adopted, about \$10,000 per month is expected for the fund which will be disbursed, under present plans, monthly.

BLOCKS DECIDE BY MON!

All blocks of Unit II are expected to have reached their decisions, whether to approve the industry or not, by Monday morning; at which time the reports will be heard in a regular congressional session.

Manzanar and Gila River Projects were already reported to have endorsed the net garnishing industry and favorably considering Plan #3 for disbursement of the income.

MANY RAMIFICATIONS

It was the consensus of opinion among the Congressional members that the entire situation is replete with many ramifications. Among the discussions brought up were those concerning the probable necessity of reshuffling the ranks of labor to meet the requirements for approximately 225 of the Unit II blocks, a total of 960 workers for the factories of the three units, and the methods of disbursing the wages.

PARENTS URGED TO HELP PREVENT MAJOR CHICKENPOX EPIDEMIC

Parents were urged to cooperate with the Poston III Public Health Department and the medical clinic in order to prevent the spreading of a light epidemic of Chickenpox which has broken out during the past few weeks. All suspected cases should be reported to the medical clinic immediately.

Because the first few cases were not reported, Chickenpox was transmitted by children, the Health Department reported in emphasizing the need for placing quarantines wherever Chickenpox broke out.

"Although we are adequately prepared to meet any emergency," the department declared, "it is more desirable to prevent the spreading of these communicable diseases than to cope with a major epidemic."
