



WRA OFFICIAL OUTLINES RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM

MIXED CHOIR TO PERFORM

Efforts of the WRA to facilitate the resettlement of evacuees have taken a definite shape, it was stated by Thomas G. Holland, National Director of Employment for the WRA, and a specific agency is being set up to take care of this phase of work. This was the information presented before the poston III community council, Issei advisers; and the block managers on Tuesday.

Under the new procedure, a leave officer—Yern Kennedy of the Poston Employment Department—will handle all applications for leaving the center; it was explained. Within a couple of weeks, leave offices will be set up at the employment agency in all three units.

All evacuees, Issei, Kibei and Nisei will be eligible to apply for a leave clearance, which will be the first step for getting a permanent leave permit. It was advised that everyone who had any intention of leaving the center should apply for clearance in order to be ready to take on outside job as soon as it is offered. The leave clearance would nominally take about a month even after the bottle necks are eliminated, Mr. Holland declared.

The WRA will concentrate on seeking placements in the mid-western area, the region roughly between Omaha, Nebraska, on the west and Cleveland, Ohio, on the east. A field agent will be placed in each of these mid-western states.

work, secretarial and stenography jobs, and some clerical positions. Professional work would be more difficult to obtain, but attempts will be made to find employment in which the individual has been accustomed to. Negotiations will be made with the management of war industries in order to find opportunities in defense work for the trained men.

A special man will be assigned to study the problem of entering the Federal Civil Service openings.

After employment is found outside, Mr. Kennedy pointed out that the individual can call for other members of the family.

He warned against concentrating in any one area.

INDUSTRY DEPTS. PREPARE FOR VARIOUS FOOD MANUFACTURING UNITS

With the continued rationing of food products in the outside markets, the Industry Dept. is now forging ahead with plans to manufacture the Center's need in substitutes: mainly Japanese products which are "difficult to obtain" from the outside source.

Under the new coordinating plan for the three units, the manufacturing of food products will be set with each unit producing their respective supply of Tofu and Moyashi. Miso and Shoyu will be manufactured by Unit 3 Industry Dept. and distributed to other two units.

Unit I Tofu factory is now under construction west of the garnishing plant, according to the Dept.
