"THINGS QUIET AT HOME" ASSERTS ROHWER CENTER
OFFICIAL IN AN INTERVIEW UPON HIS VISIT

Rev. Gordon K. Chapman, executive secretary of the Protestant Church Commission for Japanese work and a member of the National Student Relocation Council, clarified many points for prospective Unit II college students recently in a special talk to the Press representative.

Rev. Chapman emphasized the often overlooked fact that every prospective student must notify the NSRC prior to leaving the Center. Inasmuch as the NSRC is the only Agency authorized by the WRA to clear the status of such residents, he pointed out that it would speed up the clearances by contacting the West Coast headquarters, Howard B. Vealy, 1830 Sutter Street, San Francisco, California, as soon as possible.

Out of a total of 2500 applicants, the NSRC expected to clear approximately 900 students during the coming year into colleges throughout the country. In regard to scholarship, Rev. Chapman asserted that while the NSRC was endeavoring to assist every student possible, limited resources curtailed such aid to a definite minimum. It was stated that exceptional students with outstanding qualities and characteristics of scholastic and leadership abilities would be given first preference.

Lindsey Hatchett and J. F. Raines, Chief of Internal Security and of Agriculture, respectively, of the Rohwer, Arkansas, Relocation Center were Poston visitors Wednesday. COMPENSATORY LEAVE FOR OVERTIME WORKERS OKAY UNDER WRA INSTRUCTIONS

Section C of W.R.A. Instruction #27, all workers when at the direction of their Section Head, work in excess of the standard work week, shall be entitled to compensatory leave.

The workers may elect the dates of such compensatory leave with the approval of the Section Head, provided that compensatory leave is taken before termination of the job.

All employees who do not work in excess of 20-day-8-hour work day or its equivalent are considered part time workers and will receive pay on the following scale: Group I--50% per day; Group II 70% per day and Group III, 80% per day.

BLOCK NIGHTWATCHMEN DESIRES TO WORK UNDER FORMER STATUS

Unit II block night-watchmen in meeting with the block managers and Adm. James D. Crawford Wednesday morning submitted the following proposals to be presented to Ernest L. Miller, Chief Of Internal Security:
