LOW FLYING PLANES ENDANGER LIVES

A low flying U. S. army plane, sweeping down from an essterly direction, reared over the barracks at poston III barely fifty feet over the roof tops. This happened at 5:32 p.m. last Sunday. Sixteen minutes later, the same plane, a North American Mustang (Apache), returned from the north-east, again skimming over the barracks.

We are loath to bring up this subject but in view of the fact similar low flying over the colorado River Relocation center has occured several times in the past at all three units we feel that attention must be called on the serious endangering of lives-American lives-by what cannot but be considered a reprimandable act of careless on the part of the aviators involved.

whatever the intention of the aviator guilty of low flying over a densely populated community may have been, he succeeded in frightening some residents ill in bed, including a pregnant mother and an aged man suffering from a serious sickness.

Had the aviator crashed, as is always possible, the accident would have resulted in the loss of hundreds of lives as a whole section of barracks probably would have been wiped out by flames from the burning plane. Government property and lives of American citizens in the center would be listed on the loss sheet.

In recognition of the dangers of low flying, there are strict regulations regarding the navigation in the air over cities. It is most important that the aviator or aviators who are guilty of skimming their planes over the barracks should be informed of these regulations. It should be made known that poston is the third largest city in the state of Arizons. It should be made known that American property amagmerican lives are endangered.

proper authorities on the administrative staff of our relocation project should take necessary steps to prevent the repetition of low flying over the barracks. If such type of stunt flying is necessary to the training of a pilot, let it be practiced in the uninhabited and open spaces of the desert...K.H.
