COMMUNITY I COUNCIL ONLY RECOGNIZED LEGISLATIVE BODY IN POSTON I; FORMER "CENTRAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE" RELEGATED TO ADVISORSHIP ROLE

POSTON DAILY CHRONICLE SUBMITTED BY S. KIDO AS WINNING TITLE

Poston I's newly-elected Council today was recognized as the only body "authorized to transmit directly to the Project Director" recommendations affecting the welfare of that unit's residents, in a statement signed by W. Wade Head, Project Director.

The former Central Executive Board is now retained by him as his personal advisors, the statement added. Mr. Head took occasion to point out that the Council was duly elected by the people under WRA rules and that it takes the place of the old Central Executive Board which administered on a temporary basis during the Nov. 17-25 emergency. He clearly pointed out, however, that it was his wish to retain the services of the old board on a purely advisory capacity.

TRANSLATIONS RESTRICTED

Paralleling Mr. Head's announcement, Norris E. James, Press Officer, in behalf of the WRA, stated that translations in Unit I would henceforth be conducted within the strict provisions of the WRA. Mr. Head's advisory board will be permitted to make translations of WRA orders only upon the request of the Project Director for distribution in Poston I, said James yesterday. He added that they have no connection with translators attached to the office of the Administrators of Poston II and III, nor are they in any way affiliated with the Chronicle's own staff of translators, since the Chronicle is the official newspaper of the peop-

le of all 3 units and is not affiliated with any group or department of the project administration.

Mr. James further disclosed that Smoot Katow and Andrew Sugimoto, in behalf of the former Central Executive Board, had acknowledged the WRA directives applying to translations and were now working closely with him in the preparation of translations for Mr. Head. The text follows:

TO THE RESIDENTS OF POSTON AND THE ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF:

The election of the Temporary Community Council of Unit I affords the opportunity to clarify some misunderstandings which have arisen regarding evacuee government.

(1) Only one official body is recognized by the administration under the War Relocation Authority rules. That body is the duly elected Community Council which is authorized to adopt and transmit directly to the Project Director for his action recommendations in matters affecting the welfare of the residents of Poston.

(2) On December 17, the Community Council of Unit I decided that the 36 Issei members of the Temporary Civic Planning Board would be continued as the Issei advisors to the Community Council, except in cases where a written complaint is filed with the Council by residents of the block.

(3) The Central Executive Committee has been retained by me as personal advisors in matters affecting Unit I and will continue to serve in that capacity.

Beginning with this issue, Poston's newspaper will be adorned with a new masthead... Poston Daily Chronicle.

The winning name was submitted by S. Kido, 30-8-D, and was selected from a list of over 30 entries only after much hair-tearing deliberation by the editorial board, so close was the competition.

Kido's reason follow thusly: "I believe it is appropriate because the paper is to record chronologically events that occur at this outpost of the desert for pioneering endeavors of the Japanese race."

Second award of a 3 months subscription of the Chronicle was won by Henry Sasaki, 326-11-D, for his submission (Contd. on Page 2)

CHRONICLE'S FORTY-PAGE CHRISTMAS MAGAZINE

CLINIC WARNS AGAINST TAKING SHOWERS AFTER SMALLPOX VACCINATION

A special memorandum from Dr. George Wada, public Health Officer of unit 3, issued to block managers of roku 1 warned residents against taking showers for 24 hours after a smallpox vaccination.

Residents were told to take their showers before vaccination.

All people of blocks 305, 306, 307, 308, 309 and 310, which are included in roku 1, must be vaccinated for smallpox immunization if they do not have an immunization card filed with the clinic. The minimum age for vaccination is six months, it was stated.

Vaccination day for roku 1 will be Wednesday, Dec. 23, from 2 to 4 p.m., at the clinic. Block Managers were asked to announce the vaccination at the mess halls, urging everyone to be prompt and to observe all precautionary measures.

All persons quarantined for chickenpox must remain at home, it was reiterated.

The manufacturing plant, located in the ironing room of 202, is being constructed under the supervision of Mr. Toya of 211.

However, the two committee leaders expressed the hope that tofu will be produced in time for the New Year Festival.

With plenty of mungo beans available, it was stated that every Unit II kitchen may expect to serve bean cake approximately twice a week. Mr. Toya will manage the industry and is expected to have a crew of approximately four workers.
