W. E. RAWLINGS JOINS
EMPLOYMENT DEPT. AS
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

W. E. Rawlings has joined the administrative staff as assistant director of employment in Poston under V. R. Kennedy, head of the Division, it was announced here yesterday.

Rawlings arrived from eastern Idaho where he was employed as WRA employment investigator.

He is a graduate of Purdue University, majoring in agriculture. He served with the U.S. Department of Agriculture Extension Service (1928-40), and completed the following two years as state representative for the Bureau of Agriculture Economic.



CHRONICLE SEEKS TO EMPLOY 12-14 YEAR YOUTHS AS CARRIERS

Poston's largest single Christmas gift arrived late yesterday afternoon from the Student Body of the McKinley High School, Honolulu, T. H., in the form of a \$500.00 check. The check was made out to the three Poston High Schools. In this liberal handshake of Yuletide cheer from across the ocean (Neil Findley, head of the Community Services and formerly of Hawaii; "That's the meaning of Aloha"), the wish was expressed that the \$500 be spent for purchase of athletic equipment.

The gift was accompanied by a letter from Edward "Pop" Kendall to Miles Carey, Superintendent of the Poston schools. Mr. Carey was formerly principal of McKinley High School which has a student body of approximately 4,000.

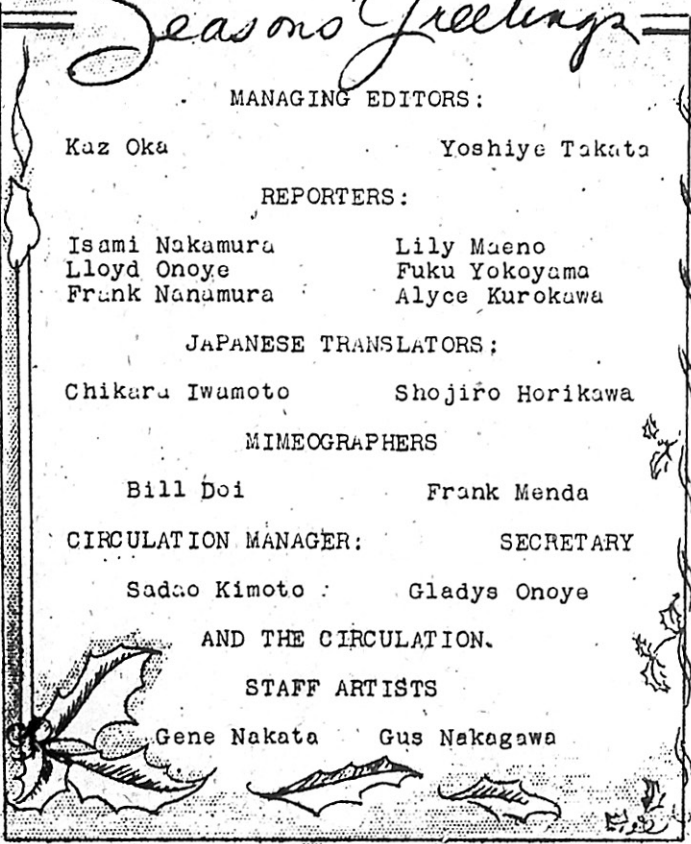

PIPE-LAYING PROGRESSES ON SCHEDULE

Pipe-laying work along the western area of the Administration quarters was progressing according to schedule, it was reported yesterday, and residents looked forward to an early use of the open land for farming.

The pipe line, it was pointed out, will carry the irrigation water from the deep well pump situated on the south-eastern corner of the unit 3 community. Running on a northerly direction just west of the Administration area, the pipe line extends approximately to the southern boundary of the camp site. It will make possible the irrigation of all the open area west of the warehouse and Administration district.

Vegetable for consumption within the center will be grown as soon as the water is available, it was declared. Experimentation at unit 3 may also be carried out, according to present plans of the Ag. Dept.
