## SHORTAGES OF NECESSITIES ON THE "OUTSIDE" ARE ACUTE OBSERVES MAENO ON BUSINESS TRIP

John Maeno, erstwhile Los Angeles attorney and now a legal advisor and Congressional chairman in Unit II, returned in time to observe Christmas in Poston from a 8-day business trip to his former home-town.

In a brief interview with a Chronicle reporter, Maeno revealed that meat, eggs, butter and vegetables were especially conspicuous by its shortages. "I went around the city", he said, "and saw many fruit stands either closed up or on the verge of folding. During my 8-day stay there, we had butter and meat only on two days."

The Nisei lawyer was taken on a brief tour of the southland, "looking over" some of various Federal Reserve warehouses in which are stored goods and the efficient way in which it was placed in the warehouses," he stated. "I think we should be thankful that the government is taking such good care of our properties."

He revealed that police officials of the southland were "up a tree" in regards to the goods stored in private (evacuee) homes. "Mexican hoodlums especially have been destructively active," Maeno reported, "breaking into such homes, destroying property and robbing. The police are unable to do anything because no complaints are filed and it is days before they find the damages committed."

Restaurant prices were reported to have been increased approximately 40% as compared with pre-war days and here, especially;

was noticeable the lack of meat and butter.

However, the sentiment in regards to Japanese, as far as Maeno was concerned, was very good. "Even in the pre-Christmas shopping rounds," he stated, "I was not molested in any way."

## UNIT TWO FIRE TOWER TOPPLES IN A GALE ON CHRISTMAS DAY

In a 35-mile per hour gale that visited Poston 2 Christmas night, the one famous landmark of Unit II which served as the lookout tower for the Fire Department toppled and crashed to the grounds.

Near casualty was averted as "Truck" Hirayama and "Dash" Kanamori left the lookout station only few minutes before the tower fell, narrowly missing the firehouse.

## GRAVELING OF ROAD STARTED BY ENGINEERS ON UNIT-2-3 HIGHWAY

In order to alleviate the existing road conditions to the Center, the Highway Engineering Dept. has commenced road graveling from Unit 3 with the construction progressing north toward Unit 2. At the present time 3 miles have been completed and 6 miles have been graded.

With plans and specifications approved for the construction of the main highway north of Unit I to Highway 72 near the Parker warehouse, the Dept. has submitted the plans to the Road Administration to secure priority and construction authorization. Construction of road south of Unit 3 is underway with 10 miles graded which will eventually intercept Highway 60 and 70.

The streets within the Center, according to the Dept., will be graveled with specifications and plans submitted to the Army Engineers who are negotiating contract for graveling of the streets. Because of shortages, oiling of the roads will be delayed, it was announced by those in charge of the works.
