

**PURCHASERS REQUESTED TO SAVE SALES SLIP COMMENCING JAN. 3**

All purchases at the stores of the Community Enterprises are to be acknowledged with cash register slips beginning as soon as the new registers arrive. This should mean that by the first of the year all purchasers will be given cash register slips showing the amount of each purchase. These slips should be saved beginning Jan. 3, 1943 so that the purchaser can claim patronage dividends that may be declared if and when the cooperative congress is authorized by referendum of the residents to do so, according to Roy Yoshida, Public Relations of C.E.

It must be pointed out that future patronage dividends or "savings" are only part of the savings made by trading at the Community Enterprise stores. The balance of the saving is made in the form of reduced prices at the time of purchase being kept as low as possible.

**"ANOTHER EVACUATION" RUMOR UNFOUNDED SAYS ASSOCIATED PRESS**

Queried by Norris James, press officer, the Associated Press News Bureau in Phoenix Ariz. yesterday said that it had no report from L.A. or San Francisco or elsewhere in the U.S. that the evacuation centers in military area 1 were to be moved inland. Harry Montgomery, A.P. Bureau Chief, Phoenix said that report was without foundation.

Today's rumor report that the army no longer will supply food with food through the Quartermaster Corps in Los Angeles. This was emphatically denied by W. Wade Head, Proj.
