PROGRESS MADE IN AGRICULTURAL WORK AT POSTON III FARM

Noticeable progress in the truck farming phase of the Agricultural program at Poston 3 was being made with the available land west of the Administration being prepared for irrigation, it was announced yesterday by the department of Agriculture.

The open area, approximately 20 acres in size has been carefully levelled, and prepared for irrigation. An intricate system of ditches will carry water from the main pipe line. The well which is located on the south-eastern corner of the community, it was stated, produces about 200 gallons of water per minute.

Plantings will probably start in February, with some eight different varieties of truck crops being considered.

Tentative plans called for the planting of 7 acres of tomatoes to be harvested around June 15; 2 acres of Italian squash to be harvested in May; 3 acres of cucumbers; 1 acre of eggplants; 1 acre of radish; 2 acres of nappa; 1 acre of onions and 2 acres of carrots.

The total tonnage of production was estimated at 52 tons for the above crops, if present plans are carried through.

Approximately 20 to 30 workers will be employed in the truck farming work, according to Mr. Tomase, manager of the truck crop farming.

CHARCOAL PRODUCTION FOR COMMERCIAL USE BEGINS AT UNIT 1

The first bundle of shipment from the Industry Dept. with the "Made in Poston" label left for San Francisco City Coal Co. as a sample for commercial consumption. The charcoal produced from mesquite trees consist of fine burning quality and lasting heat. The process' products are four feet and two feet in length.

Currently the process required 4 days with an estimated capacity of one ton per kiln. The output will be increased to 100 tons per month for export. The increasing demand for commercial use is, namely, for mining chemical and heating purposes. The unlimited supply of mesquite trees assures a profitable industry which requires a comparatively small percentage of capital for investment.

REPORT GIVEN ON GILA TRIP

In one of the most interesting Congressional sessions held Wednesday, George Ono, Poston II Fair Practice Board chairman, presented a complete report on his trip last week to the Gila River Center to inspect their camouflage plant set-up.

While the trip was made primarily to examine the net garnishing project, the committee consisting of Ono, Jimmie Takashima of Unit III, and Franklyn Sugiyama and Frank Kuwahara of Poston I, accompanied by Vernon Kennedy and Ted Haas as escorts, made the most of their journey and compiled a comprehensive report on their observations of Gila on an over-all basis as compared to Poston.

Among their pertinent views of Gila, as reported by Ono, were that milk was served only to children with adults receiving such only on a doctor's order, linoleum was laid in 2/3s of Gila's Camp I which has a population of 5000 as compared to their Butte unit which has 9000 residents, and most of the camp is supplied with iron cots.

NOVEMBER PAY ISSUED

The 14,000 residents have been paid their November cash advances. Clothing allowances for August were paid by cash and for September it was in script, clothing being purchased thru a project clothing department.

With their council still in the process of "settling down"; no judicial commission had been created. Law violators are turned over to the Maricopa County officials and are tried in outside courts.

"AG" PROGRESSING

Over 5000 acres of alfalfa land is available for the evacuees

in Gila. Some part of this area is now under cultivation and a crop has already been harvested. According to the committee's report Mr. Kennedy was informed by Gila Director Bennett that the value of the harvested crop amounted to \$800,000.

The "Ag" department seemed to be well equipped. Numerous horses, 2 "cats" (DC 6) and 12 wheel tractors, mostly John Deeres, were seen. Both men and women labor in the fields.

BETTER SOIL IN GILA

The soil is apparently better than that of Poston. No alkali was noticeable, and the texture of the earth is heavier and less sandy.

Beauty and Barber shops were yet to open in Gila. However, the canteens seemed to be stocked more substantially. Pastries of all kinds, 6 flavors of pops served by 4 distributing companies, more brands of tobacco and the "baby department had everything

but the baby" for sale.

REC HALLS FOR OFFICES

Such departments as housing, police, employment, newspaper and other community services in Gila have the use of Rec halls. However, office fixtures, such as chairs, desks, and cabinets seem to be more plentiful than in Poston.

NO CLOSE RELATIONSHIP

With Gila-ites already subjected to 4 changes in Project directors, a mild sort of confusion is apparent in the residents as each director brings a different interpretation of the WRA regulations. The close relationship as felt here between Mr. Head and the residents seem to be lacking there.

CAMOUFLAGE INDUSTRY

As for the camouflage project, it was revealed that the workers there were not bothered to any extent by the lint. After getting "used to" the work, they were able to do up to an average of 1000 square feet per day of weaving easily, with one worker turning in an average of 1900 sq. ft. daily for an entire month. The Gila workers have adopted WRA plan No. 3, the trust fund plan, with some modifications.

The average net earnings of each worker hovers around \$50 per month.

DRAMA DEPT. NEWS

Oratorical contests are being planned for the end of Feb. announced Wilfred Horiuchi, dir. of the Drama Guild. Representation will be by the Quads and winners will be determined in elimination and final competitions.

Public speaking is taught by Mrs. Martha Horiuchi, according to the Art of Extempore Speaking a text by M. Bautain of the Sorbonne. Students are being taught the difference between good and bad speakers.

"A good speaker being one who can get his message across to his audience simply and receive its assent or disagreement, and a bad speaker being one who uses elaborate words, useless gestures and says nothing," Mr. Horiuchi said.

"T" FORMATION AD. BLDGS. SEEN

According to Roy Anderson, Assistant Engineer, the present Ad. Bldg. 3 will be extended between Ad. Bldgs. 1 and 2, projecting 5 feet beyond the two adjacent Ad. Bldgs., forming the main reception hall.

When completed, the 3 Ad. Bldgs will be connected, forming one Ad. Bldg. in "T" formation, thus simplifying the working conditions in commutation between the offices located within the Ad. Bldgs.
