18 YEAR OLD POSTONIANS MUST REGISTER FOR SELECTIVE SERVICE

All Poston youths who attained the age of 18 years between July 1, 1942, and Dec. 31, 1942, will be required to register immediately for the Selective Service with their respective block managers.

Unit II Adm. James Crawford has been appointed as the Chief Registrar for Poston, officially recognized as Local Board No. 1, Yuma County, Arizona. Mr. Crawford has sworn in the block managers as special registrars.

Failure to register, or be a party to the making of false statements or counseling another to evade registration may result in imprisonment for 5 years or not more than \$10,000 fine or in both.

The registration will affect all those who were born on or after July 1, 1924, and on or before December 31, 1924.

CENTRAL "EX" BOARD SPEEDS UNIT I PUBLIC WORKS PROGRAM

Poston Unit I's public works program, which already includes construction of an elementary school building, was greatly accelerated yesterday as the Central Executive Board called for 70 additional carpenters, cement mixers and masons to work on various construction projects. Workers should report immediately to CEB headquarters in the Maintenance Bldg., Unit I, across from the Post Office.

The residents of Poston I have been informed that the Central Executive Board has undertaken construction of the main Poston canal bridge structure, located approximately 3/4 of a mile north of Unit I on the Parker road. A special crew of concrete specialists reported there for work earlier in the week and are now well advanced in construction.

It is pointed out by the CEB that the cooperation of all groups in Poston I is necessary to complete the major construction in order to facilitate and insure the spring planting to prepare for the future food production.

LATEST SELECTIVE
SERVICE RULING ON 4C
RECLASSIFICATION GIVEN

The latest directive from the Draft Board on the Selective Service ruling on 4C reclassification follows:

"Under Section 622, - 43 (a) of Selective Service regulations, Class IV-C is defined to include aliens not acceptable to the Armed Forces as follows:

"Any registrant, (whether a national of the United States or an alien) who, because of his nationality or ancestry, is within a class of persons not acceptable to the land or naval forces for training and service or to the Director of the Selective Service for work of national importance under civilian direction shall be placed in Class 4C. The Director of Selective Service will advise local boards which classes of registrants are not acceptable."

LOCAL BOARD RELEASE

Local Board Release No. 112, dated September 29, 1942, includes the following directive:

"Class of aliens not acceptable. --Registrant who are Japanese or of Japanese ancestry or parentage are not acceptable to the land or naval forces for training and ser-

"PROGRESS THROUGH UNITY" OR

TO LEAVE OR NOT TO LEAVE

1942, which will live forever in our memories, is a thing of the past. When we greeted each other with the words, "Happy New Year," we were more or less expressing our hopes for brighter days to come. And 1943 may be holding forth better things for all of us, depending upon what we intend to do.

For those who are anxious to breathe the "free air" outside of the relocation centers, the resettlement program of the WRA may hold the key. This, however, may be another of those dreams which will not materialize. Then again, it may be the beginning of the leaving of the centers by the Japanese in larger numbers to eventually return into the normal stream of American life.

For those who expect to remain in the center for one reason or another, the days of experimentation may be over. From this point on, there may be more constructive work with most of the irritations removed or corrected. As Wade Herd, our Project Director, stated in his New Year's greetings to the Poston residents at the opening ceremonies of the Festival of Unit II, it is up to the people themselves whether this sojourn at Poston will be a pleasant memory or a horrible experience which will leave unfavorable imprints.

Just as the people on the outside are suffering from rations, we in the centers are going to feel the repercussions sooner or later. Shortage of foodstuffs is becoming a grave problem on the outside. Vegetables, milk, eggs, butter, meat, canned foods and many other things are becoming scarce. We are going to receive only our share from the outside. The salvation will be in the amount the people can produce themselves in the center.

Whatever the decision of each individual is to be, it will have to be made soon. The applications for "leave clearances" are being filed in increasing numbers by the Niseis. And more and more are receiving permits to go into the "free zones".

As the months pass by, there is bound to be changes in Poston. We hope progress will be accelerated through the motto chosen for the New Year Festival, "Progress through Unity."

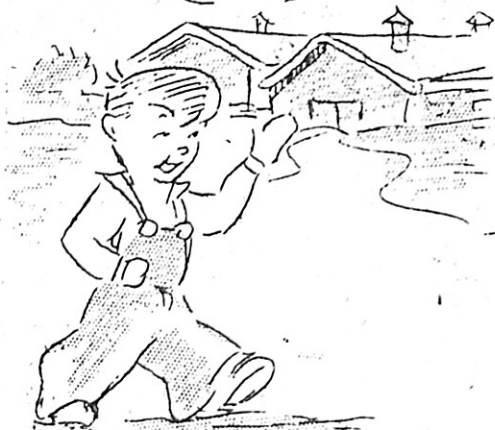

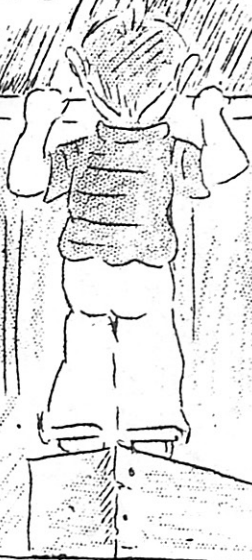
