

ADOBE PLANT STARTED YESTERDAY AT UNIT III

First experimental adobe bricks were made yesterday in Unit III under the supervision of Mr. Roy Anderson. Although there is but one mixer present, two more are expected to arrive here shortly. These mixers are used for the foundations and for mixing the adobe.

In order to facilitate immediate results, both the adobe bricks and the foundations will be made at the same time. With the first shipment of cement due on or about the 16th of this month the laying of the main foundation for the school buildings will start within a few weeks. At present there are twenty thousand feet of lumber for the school project which is to be located west of the Unit III warehouses with more enroute.

Cost of the schools for the three units is approximated at \$340,000.

As a number of workers are needed, all interested in working in the adobe plant are urged to contact the employment office immediately.

SPECIAL DIETS PROVIDED FOR POSTON THREE RESIDENTS

For the benefit of patients who require special diets, as well as for small school children, Chief Steward Burdick has begun an enormous but unique undertaking in Poston III by setting aside Mess 324 for the serving of special diets. No provisions were made by WRA for those unable to eat certain foods; therefore, Mr. Burdick literally "rolled up his sleeves" and took it upon himself to begin this humanitarian work.

All children in the first three grades receive special lunches and about 50 diabetic and ulcer cases are served 3 special meals each day of the week.

A Diabetic control office has been opened for the planning of special diet service, with Mrs. Bernice Ohashi and Mrs. Sue Hayashi as supervising nutritionists.

Unit three has the only kitchen in Poston where this special service is available and it became possible only through the efforts of Mr. Burdick.

EXCELLENT ACCOMMODATIONS OBSERVED AT GRANADA CENTER

Vastly better living accommodations than those at Poston were observed at the Granada Relocation Center by a Poston III resident, Pete Akahoshi, who visited his parents at Granada over New Year's day. This was another of a number of reports of the above nature which has been coming to Poston from various other relocation centers.

Snow from a Christmas snow storm was still on the ground when Akahoshi arrived at Granada, but housing and heating accommodations more than made up for the cold weather.

"The barracks, constructed upon brick floors, are insulated both on the inside and outside with thick cellotex material. The windows are noticeably larger in size, giving

the apartments a much more home-like appearance than the roughly constructed barracks at Poston," Akahoshi stated.

"In spite of the cold outside, the inside of the barracks are much warmer and cozier than what we have been accustomed to. Each apartment has a large army stove burning coal, which gives of considerably more heat than the oil-burning stoves," Akahoshi noted.

No two family unit have been placed in the same apartment, it was pointed out. The smallest room is four rafters wide, approximately 15 ft. by 20 ft. The larger rooms are

The road crew, which has been working on a shift, consists of engineers, tractor drivers, mechanics, and various assistants and foremen.

about the same size as the largest apartments here.

Equipment in the wash rooms also were far better than those Poston residents have been accustomed to. Men and women wash rooms for a 12-barrack block have a dozen individual porcelain basin each, together with mirrors. Stoves have been installed in wash rooms, latrines, laundry rooms and ironing rooms. Every block has in addition, five sewing machines. Lumber in sufficient quantity is available.

Food is very good. The ordering and setting of menus have been in the hands of two evacuees. Better surroundings within the dining rooms, which have concrete floors, adds to the atmosphere. The dining halls, are equipped with refrigerators about one and half times larger than those here.

With no curfew, and permission given to all residents to leave camp at any time to visit nearby towns, attend movies, to bowl or to participate in other recreation activities, Granada boasts of being one of the few centers with no internal troubles.
