President of the Poston II High School student body, Itsumi Oita, ably presided as chairman in the impressive and significant ground-breaking ceremonies held Monday afternoon at 4:30 p.m. at the west of the adobe project which will be the site of the Unit Two schools. Oita extended the greetings and opening the program were Scouts Yasuo Abe and Jim Yamaguchi who raised the flag and the spectators joined in the salute to the flag.

The first shovelful of dirt was dug by John Maeno and was followed by the honored guests.

Project Director Head said that good buildings are part of a good school and is something very important. "I think it is very important that every mother, father, young man and woman in Poston Two get these schools finished before summer."

Council chairman Maeno spoke in Japanese and directed his message especially to the parents of the students.

Adm. Crawford said he felt humble assembled on "hallowed grounds." He assured that the older people, the Council and the block managers are striving in pushing the building plans of the school.

Mr. Popkins said that when the Poston II schools are completed, they will be as modern and beautiful as any schools which the students attended previously.

Thanking the adobe crew for their untiring efforts and asking for continued cooperation was Tetsun Fukudome.

ADOBE PRODUCTION FALLS 50 PER CENT, POPKIN

With the construction materials for the Poston schools expected within a short time the Building Construction Dept. is greatly in need of manpower for the construction. The major "bottleneck" of the much belated schools lies in the adobe plant where today according to Chas. Popkin, Building Construction head, production has fallen below the 50% mark in comparison to the summer and fall output, due to labor shortage.

Today the plant no. 1 is producing 400 bricks daily with plant no. 2 production set for 175 bricks, which calls for 75 additional workers to attain the normal production in addition to the current crew of 50 and 23, respectively.

The Dept. stated that 700,000 bricks are required to complete the schools and dormitories. To date only 150,000 bricks have been made Unit 1, and it is urgent that additional workers are secured immediately in order to benefit the priority rating of AA2-X for lumber and AA-X for other materials.
