NEGLIGENCE RESULTS IN TRAGEDIES

The tragic accident which recently culminated in the death of a six-year old child should drive home to every parent and driver the necessity for utmost vigilance in going about our daily work. Lives are too dear to be so destroyed. While the driver of that particular truck was completely exonerated of all charges, we cannot help but contend that there must have been some neglicence on someone's part.

Parents of small children, especially should be wary at all times of their offspring's activities. All too often do we see tiny tots toddling across the road, apparently defying the jaws of death, in ignorant bliss of the dangerous

possibilities.
 Unfortunately the personnels of our three police departments are too limited to cope with the problems of patrolling all Poston streets. They must have the assistance of every father and mother to cut such unfortunate occurences to a minimum. Truck and auto drivers, too, must exercise the greatest caution in making their rounds.

Too many, much too many, have abused their privileges of driving by unnecessary speeding. In this regard, we command the stand taken by our police departments in enforcing all traffic regulations strictly, without fear nor favor.

great The WRA led us to have hopes about self-government. Althe powers of the Councils are limited at the present time, we have been led to expect greater autonomy to be granted as the legislative body of the people proves its ability and wins confidence. We believe that the actions of the justified Community Councils has the claim that we can govern ourselves.

To have true self-government, however, there must be that feel-ing of security. Unless we have

law and order, the very foundation cannot be firmly laid. Viewed in this light, the responsibility of the police departments of the 3 units is most important. But are they receiving the proper recognition to which they are entitled?

Our answer is definitely to the negative. The police are still rumbling around the camps in trucks when other departments have better cars at their disposal. The Unit II police had to take extreme measures of a strike in order to be adequately fed. Such steps would have been unnecessary if it is understood how important a position they occupy in our community welfare.

Under the internal security officers, the police are attending
daily classes. The academy, established to prepare the members on
the force to carry out their duties efficiently, has been imparting knowledge of law, first aid
and many other necessary subjects.
Every effort is being put forward
by the police to preserve peace
and security for all the residents.

We believe that every effort must be made to add prestige and dignity to the position of a peace officer of Poston. For a department looking after one of the most important phases which go to make self-government, they are undoubtedly the most neglected. The facilities at their disposal is inadequate. There shamefully at the present inducement little time to compensate the police forfor the great sacrifice they are making in trying to maintain law and order in the respect-

ive units.
Chiefs Shigekawa, Madokoro and Sato have done an excellent job under trying conditions. We believe the community as a whole appreciates all they have done. Instead of lip service, we believe the time has come to show the feelings of the people in a more tangible manner by helping them to elevate their department to one which we can look upon with pride.
