

PEOPLE REJECT NET FACTORY PLAN

The first all-Poston balloting by the people witnessed the rejection of the plan submitted by the special committee of the three Units' Community Councils to operate the local net garnishing factories, it was revealed late yesterday afternoon. A tabulation of the votes by 20 representatives of the 3 Poston councils, fair practice and labor boards and block managers in the personnel mess hall of Unit 2 disclosed that 3,743 residents, out of a total of 7,153 votes cast, vetoed the proposal.

With the rejection of the plan, which issue was partly clouded by the recommendation that one Dividend Fund be established for all of Poston, the way is now clear for the residents to take up other ways and means of operating the plants or flatly rejecting it.

Three Alternatives

Three alternatives now face the people: (1) Operate the factory and allow each worker to retain all earnings; (2) Operate by Units and set up separate Trust Funds; or (3) Reject, entirely the garnishing work.

Yesterday's representatives of the people gathered in Unit II to count the votes, in a brief meeting held after the tabulation, moved to bring the issue up Unit by Unit and block-by-block and continue negotiations to arrive at some satisfactory compromise.

Government Anxious

It was disclosed by Vernon R. Kennedy, Employment Director, that in a telephonic conversation with John Stahl, Los Angeles contractor for the plants, Washington, DC, is anxious

to have the factories operating as early as possible. It was indicated by the Government that since no provisions were made for the weaving of nets other than in relocation centers and since time is too short to construct factories elsewhere, it was imperative that work be started.

Councils to Canvass

The Councils are due to immediately canvass their respective units inasmuch as it was revealed to Kennedy that Stahl has planned to send his personal representative to Poston. The agent is expected to arrive here Friday.

In discussing the small margin by which the proposal was defeated Tuesday, Kennedy stated that much confusion was aroused in the voting by the issue concerning the 4C reclassification, "which was taken by many citizens as meaning that they would not be permitted to work in the factory." He emphatically denied such an interpretation of the Selective Service ruling.

MORE POSITIONS OPEN IN WASHINGTON, D.C., FOR NISEI SECRETARIES

An inquiry received by the local Employment Department this week disclosed that the Solicitor General in Washington, D.C., is interested in placing secretarial help with various governmental agencies.

The salary is reported to be \$1620 per year. All those interested should apply at their respective Employment bureau immediately.

Approximately 59% of Poston's eligible voters participated as 7,153 out of a qualifying total of 12,096 marched to the polls.

Committee Commended

Despite the negative action taken by the majority, Kennedy commended the committee for their endeavors.

"I am deeply gratified by their willingness to work for the good of Poston and compromise their differences of opinion and their intelligent approach to the problems," he said yesterday.

Operation of the net plants will materially raise Poston's living standards besides offsetting adverse nationwide publicity concerning the Japanese.



NEGLIGENCE RESULTS IN TRAGEDIES

The tragic accident which recently culminated in the death of a six-year old child should drive home to every parent and driver the necessity for utmost vigilance in going about our daily work. Lives are too dear to be so destroyed. While the driver of that particular truck was completely exonerated of all charges, we cannot help but contend that there must have been some negligence on someone's part.

Parents of small children, especially should be wary at all times of their offspring's activities. All too often do we see tiny tots toddling across the road, apparently defying the jaws of death, in ignorant bliss of the dangerous possibilities.

Unfortunately the personnels of our three police departments are too limited to cope with the problems of patrolling all Poston streets. They must have the assistance of every father and mother to cut such unfortunate occurrences to a minimum. Truck and auto drivers, too, must exercise the greatest caution in making their rounds.

Too many, much too many, have abused their privileges of driving by unnecessary speeding. In this regard, we command the stand taken by our police departments in enforcing all traffic regulations strictly, without fear nor favor.

MOST NEGLECTED DEPARTMENT

The WRA led us to have great hopes about self-government. Altho the powers of the Councils are limited at the present time, we have been led to expect greater autonomy to be granted as the legislative body of the people proves its ability and wins confidence. We believe that the actions of the Community Councils has justified the claim that we can govern ourselves.

To have true self-government, however, there must be that feeling of security. Unless we have

law and order, the very foundation cannot be firmly laid. Viewed in this light, the responsibility of the police departments of the 3 units is most important. But are they receiving the proper recognition to which they are entitled?

Our answer is definitely to the negative. The police are still rumbling around the camps in trucks when other departments have better cars at their disposal. The Unit II police had to take extreme measures of a strike in order to be adequately fed. Such steps would have been unnecessary if it is understood how important a position they occupy in our community welfare.

Under the internal security officers, the police are attending daily classes. The academy, established to prepare the members on the force to carry out their duties efficiently, has been imparting knowledge of law, first aid and many other necessary subjects. Every effort is being put forward by the police to preserve peace and security for all the residents.

We believe that every effort must be made to add prestige and dignity to the position of a peace officer of Poston. For a department looking after one of the most important phases which go to make up self-government, they are undoubtedly the most neglected. The facilities at their disposal is shamefully inadequate. There is little inducement at the present time to compensate the police force for the great sacrifice they are making in trying to maintain law and order in the respective units.

Chiefs Shigekawa, Madokoro and Sato have done an excellent job under trying conditions. We believe the community as a whole appreciates all they have done. Instead of lip service, we believe the time has come to show the feelings of the people in a more tangible manner by helping them to elevate their department to one which we can look upon with pride.

CHRONICLE'S SERIES OF ARTICLE ON W.R.A. LEAVE CLEARANCE PROCEDURE CLARIFIED

The WRA is inviting all Japanese evacuees to apply for Leave Clearance now so as to avoid delay in the issuance of leave and travel permits when harvest work and other offers of outside employment are received or when emergencies arise.

WHAT IS LEAVE CLEARANCE? It is official permission from the Director to release an evacuee upon proper application from the Project for permanent relocation, for group work and for emergency travel. This permission is granted after investigation and checking of references by the WRA and the FBI.

WHO MAY APPLY FOR LEAVE CLEARANCE? Any evacuee 17 years of age or over wishing to obtain leave clearance and have references checked may apply so that leave of any type may be processed without delay. All members of a family who plan to leave together should apply at the same time. Applications for clearance shall be encouraged in order to build up a register of persons interested in and eligible for outside employment or permanent

relocation. All as their dependents and that these payments are retroactive to August 12, the date of the founding of their Community Enterprises. AFTER LEAVE CLEARANCE WHAT? When leave clearance is approved and on file in the local Leave Office, three types of leaves may be applied for and secured in a short time: (1) Indefinite Leave. This type of leave is for those who want to leave the Project for permanent relocation and employment anywhere in the United States outside of the restricted areas. A worker or a family must have a definite job before leave the Project. After having accepted the job and having reported for work, the worker may resign and seek other jobs or the employer may discharge the worker. Evacuees on indefinite leave are free to resume normal life outside the restricted areas and enjoy all the freedom, privilege and responsibility of any citizen. The only obligation is to advise the WRA in Washington of any change of address for the duration. About one month is required to secure leave a permit to leave after clearance is approved. Evacuees on indefinite leave may return to their respective Project if they are unable, for any reason or circumstance, to adjust themselves to relocation.

PLANS FOR CENTRALIZED SCHOOL

Recognizing need for a centralized high school, between now and the finishing of the above buildings, of approximately six months, the Education and Housing Committees of Unit I Council met last Tuesday, in Ad. I, drawing up a plan to be presented to the Council, of how to create a centralized school.

36 blocks would, if the plan is accepted, draw lots to determine which one shall be evacuated. The one determined would move into other blocks, wither doubling up with small families or placing them into smaller rooms made by setting up partitions. Future arrival of 322 partitions will make possible such a step.

The evacuated block will then be used as the high school.

Need for this system was expressed because so many students walk too much with the present system and tend to take courses that calls for minimum walking.
