

U.S. ARMY TO FORM NISEI DIVISION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28, (AP)---The United States Army announced today plans for a combat unit of loyal Japanese Americans. Secretary of War Henry Stimson said the decision to organize a Japanese American combat unit, including infantry, artillery, engineer, and medical personnel was based on "the inherent right of every faithful citizen, regardless of ancestry, to bear arms in the nation's battle."

The Secretary of War also intimated a greater use of loyal Japanese American in war jobs when he declared: "The War Department's action is part of a larger plan which will enable all loyal American citizens of Japanese ancestry to make their proper contribution toward winning the war through employment in war production as well as military service."

With facilities being made available throughout this country, including War Relocation Authority centers, and in Hawaii, the Army will accept volunteers for induction through the Selective Service system, it was disclosed.

"The action was taken," Stimson explained, "following a study by the War Department of many earnest requests by loyal American citizens of Japanese extraction for the organization of a special unit of the army in which they could have their share in the fight against the nation's enemies."

Chairman Chandler (Dem., Ky.) of the Senate subcommittee on military affairs said that he had been informed nearly two-thirds of the 106,000 residents of relocation centers could be released for military service or wartime production.

Announcement that the Army will form a combat unit composed of Americans of Japanese ancestry based on the Selective Service system drew commendation from Project Director W. Wade Head, just returned from San Francisco. "Today's news," he said, "consummates a long campaign on the part of thousands of Nisei and their parents as well as a vast host of their Caucasian friends throughout the United States. It is a tremendous victory."

"Within the next few days," the Project Director declared, "the complete procedures now being prepared by the Selective Service in Washington, D. C., will be announced. Paralleling this move, we will also make announcement of a general speeding up process in leave clearance which, we hope, will permit us to place hundred of women, as well as men who physically are not accepted by the Army, in war jobs throughout the country."

"Today, I believe," Project Director Head remarked, "all Poston will join me in saying this is the best news we have received in a long time. There are much happier, more vital times ahead for all Nisei and their parents."

"RIGHT OF EVERY CITIZEN TO BEAR ARMS"...STIMSON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29 --(SPECIAL)-- At a press conference in his office yesterday morning, Secretary of War Henry Stimson issued the following press release:

The War Department announced today that plans have been completed for the admission of a substantial number of American citizens of Japanese ancestry to the army of the United States. This action was taken following a study by the War Department of many earnest requests by loyal American citizens of Japanese extraction for the organization of a special unit of the army in which they could have their share in the fight against the nation's enemies. The following statement was issued by the Hon. Henry L. Stimson, secretary of war:

"It is the inherent right of every faithful citizen regardless of ancestry to bear arms in the nation's battle. When obstacles to the free expression of that right are impaired by emergency considerations those barriers should be removed as soon as humanly possible. Loyalty to country is a voice that must be heard and I am glad that I am now able to give active proof that this basic American belief is not a casualty of war."

The War Department announced that the initial procedure in the formation of the unit authorized by the secretary will be voluntary induction. Facilities for this will be nationwide including the Hawaiian Islands, and the War Relocation Authority centers in this country. No individual will be inducted if doubt exists as to his loyalty. Upon induction the "Nisei", as American citizens of Japanese parentage are termed, will begin training as a combat team for service in an active theater. This combat team will include the customary elementaries of infantry, artillery, engineer and medical personnel.

No effort will be spared in developing it into an efficient well-rounded hard-hitting unit. The new unit will be trained sep-

MYER, WRA CHIEF PRAISES WAR DEPT.

"I find deep satisfaction in the announcement by the Secretary of War, Henry L. Stimson, that a combat team composed of American citizens of Japanese ancestry is to be recruited by the U.S. Army for active service in a theater of war.

This announcement makes January 28, 1943, the most significant date of the last 10 months for a person of Japanese ancestry in the United States.

Many have told me in conversation and letters of their desire for active service in the armed forces of the country. For many months I have been looking forward with them to the time when their desire might be realized. All the facilities of the War Relocation Authority, both at the relocation centers and in Washington, will be immediately placed at the disposal of the War Department to speed the formation of the combat team announced by Mr. Stimson."

DEATH RIDES THE RAILS TO POSTON

The car was quiet with a puzzled silence, as if the people could not grasp the idea that one among them had died, and the comings and goings of the grey-haired nurse, the young doctor, and the M.P.'s were watched with morbid curiosity. A baby cried, sensing something frightening.

Then the rustle of lunch boxes being opened came to Shu's ears. He shrugged, even though a man died, the living must eat.

Something bothers Shu and a vague suspicion pricked him. He looked toward Mrs. Koike, the dead man's mother. It was evident that she was shaken, but she was not weeping. Her face was a stoic mask as it leaned over her knitting.

Shu went over and introduced himself. A few polite condolences, and then suddenly, "Was Tsuyoshi subject to heart attacks or apoplexy?"

"Murder? I examined him. He wasn't strangled or shot or anything. It's bad enough him dying without your trying to make a case of murder out of it. This is the first time anyone's died on an evacuee train."

"Everyone on the car hated him. They all had reason to kill. It could have been poison."

"You've been reading too many mystery stories."

"Sure, I have. It's my hobby. And one thing it's taught me is that a lot of so-called natural deaths are really perfect crimes."

The young doctor cursed, not wanting to believe him. But he was becoming interested. And do you think you can solve the murder, if it is a murder?"

"Maybe. Do I have your permission to try?"

The doctor shrugged and sighed. "Go ahead. Do you want to examine the body?" He wasn't at all sure that he should be letting Shu interfere, but he was young and the more Shu talked the more he was convinced that there was something to what he was saying.

Koike still looked as if he were enjoying a deep sleep, except that his face was rather pale. It did seem a natural death, so natural that Shu would not have been too surprised if the man had suddenly turned over, muttering angrily. "They hate me," and then gone back to sleep. He talked awhile to the doctor and then decided to do a little investigation.

Shu had had no experience in such matters. But he had read detective stories all his life--well, nearly all--and now he was going to put some of that gleaned knowledge to use. Besides, he had always had contempt for the way the storybook detectives always allowed a few more to be murdered before they solved the case. There would only be one victim here, that man now covered with a blanket and lying in the M.P. car, if he had anything to say about it.

He would begin by interviewing all likely suspects. Everyone with the exception of the baby and the children--though that little gnoul Yoyo was capable of anything, he thought--everyone was suspect. Ever himself, he had to admit. Come to think of it, he had had the best opportunity to commit the crime because he was the only one who had associated with the fellow. If he weren't so absolutely positive that he hadn't done it, the first thing he would do would be to put himself under arrest.

"Did you kill the man, Shu Shingu?" he asked himself.

"Nope," he answered.

"I didn't think you did. But you're really sure?"

"Of course. Don't be so persistent."
