

NO JAPANESE CLASSES IN WRA CENTERS

WRA official instructions specifically for bids the teaching of the Japanese language in Relocation Centers. This was the gist of a memorandum sent out by John Powell, local Director of Community Activities, to all adult education departments of Poston.

It was ruled that such language classes are forbidden to be conducted in either public elementary and High Schools or in adult education groups.

However, believing that such a course is desirable to be carried on under authoritative educational supervision," Powell stated that he has already "argued with the WRA" to change their rulings and optimistically notes that he will "reopen the subject with WRA on the basis of recent evidence of interest and need."

CHICAGO WAR FIELD OFFICE WORKER HERE

Miss Penelope Ross, affiliated with the Chicago, Illinois WRA field office, is a Poston visitor for approximately two weeks. During her brief stay here, Miss Ross is also expected to put in some time to enrich her background so that she may fulfill her WRA duties in Chicago in the best interests of the evacuees.

NOTICE TO EVACUEES

According to word received by the Chronicle, evacuees should make sure that their time-keepers have complete time records for January not later than Feb. 2 in order that the Jan. pay roll can be completed.

UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FILING URGED

"The states of California and Arizona maintain their original position that so long as the evacuees reside in a relocation center, they are not available for work and therefore not eligible for unemployment compensation benefits," asserted Ted. H. Haas, project attorney today.

"However", Haas continued, "it is imperative that despite any rules of the Unemployment Compensation Commissions, all applicants for unemployment benefits should file application for compensation as soon as possible. Otherwise, even if the States should ever reverse their positions on this matter, a resident who has not filed proper papers would not receive any benefits."

Applications are to be filed with the Yuma office of the U.S. Employment Service; and then to be forwarded to the proper state officials.

MY VISIT TO GILA . . . THE MAIL BAG ---

A.W. EMPIE, CHIEF ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER

I visited the Gila Relocation Project on Tuesday, Jan. 19, for the purpose of making comparisons between the two Projects in as many respects as the limited time would allow. GILA HAS SET A HIGH STANDARD WHICH POSTON HAS YET TO ACHIEVE

MESS HALLS AND WAREHOUSES:

In an inspection of mess halls, kitchens, and subsistence warehouses, a very high degree of efficiency was observed in all lines of work but more especially from the standpoint of cleanliness. Everything was spic and span. Pantries were in tip-top shape, warehouses were clean and well arranged, and bin cards were installed and up to date, maintaining a perpetual inventory system. The residents of Gila may well be proud of their efforts in this line of endeavor.

CASH ADVANCES:

Cash advances are paid by check at Gila as they are here. Clothing allowances are also paid by check. Very little, if any, difficulty, however, is experienced in securing adequate cash for check-cashing purposes, which makes it much easier from a fiscal standpoint.

Cash advances at Gila are being paid this week for the month of December. Our cash advances for the month of December will probably be paid sometime during the first part of Feb. We have yet to overcome the loss of time sustained during the strike period but if no unforeseen adverse conditions arise we will be up to date on this phase of the work by the first of March.

TRANSPORTATION

Insofar as transportation facilities are concerned, Poston is far ahead of Gila. Gila is not only short of facilities but is more strictly rationed on gasoline. Greater conservation of transportation facilities must be observed at Poston in the future, especially in view of the fact that much of our equipment which has been loaned to this Project is being taken over by other war-time services. It was observed also at Gila that all vehicles were maintained in better condition due to the operation of car washing and servicing facilities.

GENERAL APPEARANCES:

There is of course, hardly any comparison between Gila and Poston insofar as general appearances are concerned inasmuch as the Gila Center is located on a better soil for a camp site and the fact that the buildings are constructed of more desirable material. I am inclined to believe that the houses at Poston are as durable but the appearance of the ones at Gila seems to contribute to the general welfare of the whole Project.

CONCLUSIONS:

While the Gila Project has set high standards and while in some respects their state of progress may be considered further advanced, I am convinced that the people of Poston are capable of attaining even higher standards of efficiency and that this will be done in the not too distant future.

S. Aihara of the Flatfoots showed his stuff by bucketing 12 points, twice as much as scored by Nagata from the Blk. 22 team.

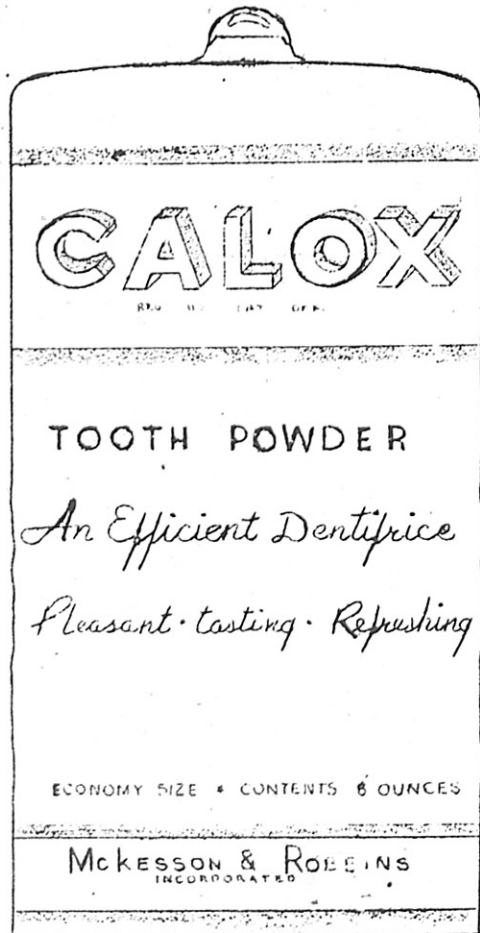

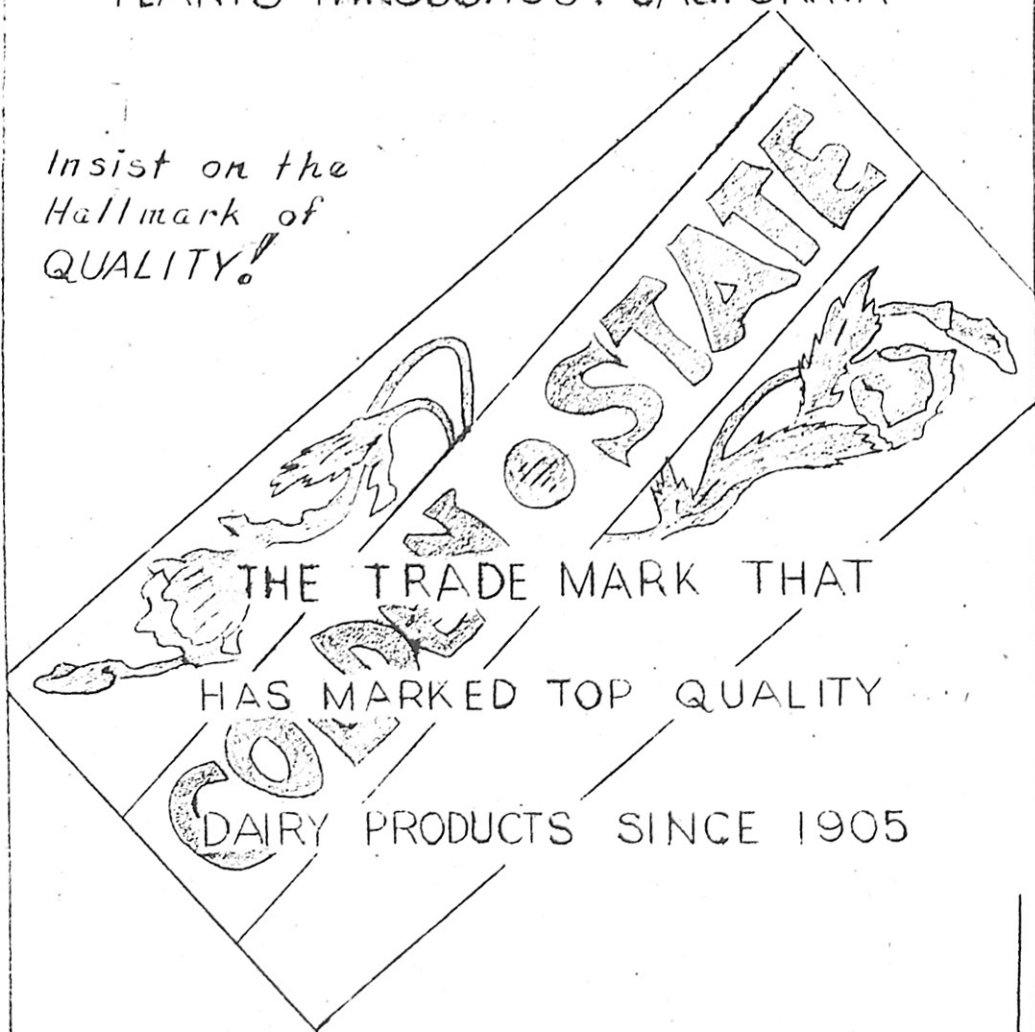
