

## EIGHT HELD FOR FELONY CHARGE

### STATE COURT TO TRY MEN FOR ASSAULT ON JACL HEAD

A gang of eight evacuees, ranging in age from 18 to 37, were found guilty of having committed a felony by the Poston II Judicial Commission for an asserted attack on Mr. and Mrs. Saburo Kido, 215-3D early Sunday morning and, in accordance with WRA Administrative Instruction #34, were extradited to the Yuma County law enforcement officials for trial in the Superior Court of the State of Arizona. The eight evacuees, all of whom made written confessions admitting their participation in the crime, were charged with asserted assault and battery on the Kidos Sunday morning at 2 o'clock with intent to commit great bodily harm.

Kido was reported to be resting comfortably in the Poston General Hospital and will be confined to bed for several days with bruises about his head, shoulder and arms. Mrs. Kido was not injured.

The efficient work of the Unit II police force resulted in the immediate apprehension of those who were confessedly responsible for the attack. The Judicial Commission then met in an emergency session at 4:15 a.m., Sunday, in the police headquarters. After hearing and discussing the evidence against the eight youths, the Commission brought in the decision that the attack constituted a felony, thereby automatically relinquishing their authority of conducting a trial in Poston to the State.

Those who were charged with the asserted attack included: George Inouye, 207-2B; James Y. Tanaka, 227-6D; Tadao Hasegawa, 2072-B; Tetsuo Inokuchi, 214-6B; Mitsuo Kurimoto, 216-8A; Hisoichi Matsuda, 211-14D; Kataru Umaba, 220-5D; and James Toya, 211-5A. They were accompanied by Project Attorney T.H. Eas, and an evacuee attorney to Yuma.

## EVACUEES URGED TO APPLY FOR CLEARANCE

INS SAYS PLANS UNDERWAY TO FIND WAR JOBS

All evacuee residents, tending with the expectation of leaving Poston for any kind of outside employment are urged to apply for leave clearances as early as possible at their respective leave office located in each of the three Units' Employment Bureaus. ## APPLICANTS FOR NET FACTORY EMPLOYMENT INTERVIEWED IN UNIT I

Beginning of garnishing net production advanced another step closer to reality today with the interviewing of applicants for jobs in the factory, after endorsement of the net project by the Unit I Council.

At the block meetings, which were held Friday night following Project Director W. Wade Hood's appeal to the residents to reconsider their vote, the people authorized the Council by act in the way in which it thought best.

### WRA REPORTS

#### OFFICER VISITS

Allen Harkley, member of the WRA Reports Office at Washington, is visiting in Poston together with H.M. Tezier, head of the Reports Office, it was disclosed yesterday.

Both men, on a tour of six of the ten relocation centers, arrived on Saturday morning. They are expected to leave Tuesday night. Actual conditions in the centers are being studied, it was stated, so that the policies will fit the realities.

The Council by an unanimous vote accepted the net factory and favored an immediate beginning of work.

From the applicants now being interviewed, an initial crew of about 150, including many key workers, will be selected to begin work this week as trainees in the Unit I factory. Eventually, when the garnishing net project is in full production, it will employ about 1000 workers, 500 of whom will be from Unit I. Applications for positions (cont. on page 2)

## JOINT T.C.C. APPROVE BOARD

With assurance from W.W. Head, Proj. Dir. that the resignation of the former Central Executive Board and Labor Rel. Board will be accepted, the joint T.C.C. acted on a proposal submitted by F. Fukuda and Com. for a new Ad. Board at Sumo Hqtr., Jan. 29 at 2 p.m. The plan was accepted with a few minor changes and an amendment.

S. Nagai was selected by the Issei for chairmanship, and Mas Kawashima, Nisei, vice-chmn. to the body. The other 6 members of this body will be appointed by the chmn. and vice-chmn. with the approval of the joint T.C.C. The body shall act as advisors to Mr. Head.

The proposal for the Labor Rel. Board, presented by J. Nakai and the Com. was approved by the joint T.C.C.

Geo. Kurata informed the T.C.C. of the Pub. Rel. Com. selecting M. Iwatate and Fukumoto as translators of the English news to Japanese. They will be located in the rooms occupied by the former Central Executive Board.

S. Nomura read a recommendation for equipment from the Chief of Police, Shigekawa.

## Law Dept. HANDLES VARIETY OF WORK

According to Ted Haas, Project Attorney, Law Dept. at the present time comprises the following div.: Insurance Evacuee Property, Tax and other Accounting Problems, Notary Public, Community Council, Judicial Commission and Legal. The number of tax problems is assuming large proportion, according to Mr. Haas.

The variety of work is shown by the monthly report, which covers such subjects as litigation, powers of attorney, wills, divorces, selective service appeals, assistance in many problems including the following wills, repatriation, notarization, insurance, absentee ballots, bill of sale, commercial and farm property, condemnation, law and order problems, and leave, says Mr. Haas. They had been handling requests for re-hearing in the matter of interned aliens, also, but these matters are now being handled by the Social Welfare Office.

The Law Dept. has been carrying the load for the other depts. and are now hoping to be able in the near future, to confine itself to legal matters.

## CHANDLER TO HEAD SUB-COMMITTEE

In reply to a wire that was addressed to Sen. Mon. C. Wallgren of the Sub-Committee for investigation, Jan. 19, by the Temporary Community Council, a letter dated Jan. 25th was received by the Unit I T.C.C.:

"The request of the T.C.C. of Colorado River War Relocation Project has been referred to Senator Chandler who will head the Sub-Committee of Military Affairs Committee which is investigating the handling of war relocation problems.

"I am sure that Senator Chandler will make it possible for Representative of your Council to appear before the Sub-Committee when it is in Poston."

With the relocation program being continually accelerated by the WRA, the leave clearance procedures are being thoroughly systematized and speeded-up. A goal of 4000 evacuees of Poston to be resettled on the outside has been established and every possible effort is being expended by the Administration to attain that end.

sary for the various jobs is available either at the employment or block managers' office.

Final determination of a wage disbursement plan will rest with the workers. They will select an equitable plan from several which will be submitted to them for consideration by the council. When finally accepted the plan will be retroactive to the date on which work began.
