

CERAMIC PLANS FOR PROJECT BEING MADE

Preparations to start a ceramic project are being made by Bob Kinoshita, at Blk. 46, as a Dept. of Community Activities, the project to be for production and education.

Bob Kinoshita, who has had a studio in which he did integrated designing in ceramics, textiles, wood, and metal, states that every thing is here to start a small studio of ceramics, but in order to make commercial ware in quantity, they need more equipment than is here now. They will start in a small scale, then get the heavy machinery for mass production of dinnerware. Kiln and small equipment and raw materials are already here, he said.

Mr. Kinoshita says there are now three men working at the project.

DELIVERIES OF OILS ASSURED

Due to the muddy condition of the streets, and the difficulty in securing deliveries, oil and kerosene distributing crews are faced with a serious problem in furnishing oil and kerosene for cooking and heating purposes. As rapidly as is humanly possible, oil and kerosene are being distributed and the impending shortages will soon be averted, according to F. M. Haverland, Supply and Transportation Officer.

ORGANIZATION COMMISSION ADOPTS DRAFT

After a few changes had been made, the Organization Commission unanimously adopted the draft of the Charter, prepared by the Drafting Committee, Jan. 20, according to the Law Dept., recently. It was decided that the Charter would be translated into Japanese, and submitted to the local Councilmen and to blks. for discussion. The Charter provided for a Council for all Poston, in addition to local Councils. Local Council is to be elected by blk. residents, if the draft is accepted, then they will elect their representatives to the Community Council of Poston.

Towers of the Council as named in the draft, are generally: to prescribe regulations and penalties for violations; to present to the Pro. Dir. questions affecting the welfare of the residents on all matters; to solicit and receive funds for Community purposes and to administer the same, to enact licencing ordinances, the total of licence fees not to exceed \$1000 for any calendar year.

The Community Council would provide for the establishment of depts, committees, and commissions which are deemed necessary for the general welfare of the community.

The Charter also provides for the initiative, referendum, recall, and also the judicial commission.

Any persons with personal effects now in private storage in Sacramento, California, who wish to have their property shipped to Poston, Arizona are requested to get in touch with the Supply and Transportation Office in Poston, I as soon as possible, stated F.M. Haverland.

This request is made for the following reasons: it is only possible to ship household goods in carload lots and unless that quantity is available at the Federal Reserve Warehouse in Sacramento, we shall not be able to affect the transfer of property to this Project at the present time.

OILERS THUMP BEARS 29-27 IN OVERTIME! YOGI EZAKI'S SHOT IN FINAL SECONDS WINS CONTEST

KOBATA SCORES 28 PTS BUT BERDGO UPSETS VALLEY 51 TO 46

BAKERSFIELD COMES FROM BEHIND TO TOPPLE GOLDEN BEARS FROM UNDEFEATED RANKS

In a cage thriller that featured two of the league's top scorers in action, the San Berdoo quint upset the strong Valley team, 51 to 46 last Sat. night on the Blk. 27 court.

Piloted by Mitch Teshima, who personally accounted for 14 points, the Berdoods held a 26-22 advantage in the fast first half. The game really opened up in the second period as Teshima and Kobata put on one of the best scoring duels yet to be seen this season. Kobata chalked up 20 points in that second period but it wasn't enough to overtake the hot Berdoo-men who managed to keep a step ahead of the Valley five.

Kobata copped high point honors of the fracas with 13 field goals and two free shots for a 28-point total. Teshima also boosted his scoring average, tallying nine field goals and six charities for 24 points.

Before a packed crowd of nearly 2500 enthusiastic spectators, the Bakersfield Oilers put on a show to come from behind, nosing out the mighty Golden Bears in an overtime contest, 29-27, on Firemen's Court, Sunday, Jan. 31st.

The loss was a heart-breaker for the G.B.'s as they led throughout the contest 'til the last 30 seconds when Eddie Nakamura came through with an "under the bucket" set-up shot to tie the game; but was fouled on the next play and missed the all-important free point, ending the game 23-23, and throwing the game into overtime.

The Gee Bees again went ahead in the overtime with Mizuno and Kadowaki's field goals, but dead-eye Ezaki and Nakamura matched buckets to knot the count 27 all with less than a minute to go, then hero Yogi Ezaki, in a Frank Merriwell finish, came through with a miracle shot to ice the fray. G.B.'s led the Oilers 6-5 at the quarter and 12-11 at intermission.

Yogi Ezaki led his teammates with 13 di-

gits while T. Eno and G. Mizuno shared scoring honors with ten points apiece for the loser. As usual, E. Nakamura and J. Kadowaki played a bang-up defensive game for their respective teams.
