

## FOOD SITUATION CIVIL SERVICE NET WORKERS EXPLAINED AT RE-OPENING OF TO MEET WITH TCC MEETING JOBS IMMINENT CONTRACTOR SAT.

C. E. Snelson, Proj. Steward, gave a refreshing talk before the TCC, elaborate with humor, outlining the present food situation at the TCC meeting held last Tues., Feb. 2, at Unit I. He revealed that his department has the next 45 days food supply ordered and most of it is now confined in the ideal warehouses. The only exception is the perishables, which will arrive as needed.

Snelson pointed out that there was no cause for panic in some mess halls because he had ordered some particular foods picked up and returned to him.

"We are following the War Department's orders limiting the mess halls to 3 days' food on hand in kitchen storerooms", stated Snelson. "This is one method that we are complying with the national food ration. However, when we deliver 3 days' food, we want the mess halls to use them up to that period. A fresh supply will be sent as soon as it is consumed. As for the food being picked up now, I am only asking that the food which does not agree with Japanese tastes, such as shredded wheat, cracked wheat, corn meal and prunes, and such other food which may be considered surplus, returned to conserve storage space in the mess halls."

Another point that Snelson stressed was the need of more waitresses in the appointed personnel kitchen. He

In preparation for the imminent reopening of many new civil service opportunities to evacuees, the employment division today requested all residents who are on the civil service eligibility list and who have filed leave clearance to come to the Unit I employment office and fill out three more blanks (standard Form 57). These will be forwarded to Washington.

It was further emphasized that all candidates eligible for federal employment should apply for leave clearance if they have not done so yet. This, the division explained, is to expedite release as rapidly as possible when outside job opportunities occur.

### MESS HALLS UNCOOPERATIVE FOR HOG FARM

According to the Ag. Dept., the garbage crew is now under the supervision of the Hog Div. which has taken the burden of disposing of the center's 14 tons of daily garbage. The garbage is used to feed the 200 hogs which are to be slaughtered by the residents as meat subsistence.

The mess halls, according to the reports, are not cooperating with the hog production in segregating garbage. Only 75 percent of the mess halls are segregating their garbage, according to the instructions issued.

## ED. COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

The high school in Unit I will be constructed by evacuee labor. Four or five workers will be recruited from each block at once to lay the adobe bricks. These points were definitely decided in the TCC meeting last Tuesday afternoon in Ward 7 at the Hospital.

The education and housing committee submitted the results of an investigation showing the impossibility of evacuating a single block to accommodate the high school. Crowded storage space for merchandise and food precluded the use of warehouses as a possible site for the high school. The committee further reported that it was impractical to move buildings from other sites to the school campus due to the question of ownership. The U.S. Army Engineers hold title to the buildings, it is believed, but some other department in the Government might hold some claim of ownership. There is a possibility that it might take some time to straighten out the ownership angle to obtain consent to move the barracks.

Then, if the buildings were moved from elsewhere, due to priorities, it is believed that some time might pass before the plumbing equipment would be available. It was pointed out to the Council by the committee that even though consent to move the buildings to the high school campus might be obtained, the negotiations would consume time. Instead of delaying further, the committee recommended that since the materials and supplies are here, the construction start immediately. It is estimated that a new building could be completed in 6 weeks time with the residents' cooperation. While time was being lost in negotiations, it was shown that several buildings might be erected in the meanwhile.

The committee, after the meeting, approached various Administration officials concerning the feasibility of paying the school construction labor, \$19.00; and importing 5 experienced adobe architects and masons from the outside to supervise the work on the new buildings. Mr. Head indicated his approval to the committee's proposal but he asked a little time to study the wage proposition.

## TRAINING IN DEFENSE PLANT POSSIBILITIES

Possibilities for establishing Defense Training courses in mechanical and agricultural fields in Poston with qualified trained instructors were bright today after Dr. Judd from the Arizona State Department of Vocational Education and Elmo Jensen from Parker High School had discussed tentative plans with a committee composed of Dr. John Powell, Dr. Walter Balderston, Kenji Nakane, Y. Kobayashi, and Michio Kunitani.

Sponsored by the Out-of-School Youth and Adult Division of the U. S. Office of Education, the training program offers six to ten weeks courses to youth and adults who aren't attending school at present.

Mechanical courses which can be offered here include care and repair of tractors and tools, metal work, construction carpentry, elementary electricity, and repair of farm machinery. Among the agricultural courses are milk production, poultry, egg and pork production, truck crops and seed production, and the training of general farm labor.

The Poston garage and machine shop and Parker High School are being considered as possible places where the courses may be conducted, with the added possibility of utilizing the equipment of the Valley School and the Indian Agency in Parker.

Poston, like all other cities in the United States, is strictly adhering to the rationing program and feels that it is her patriotic duty to comply with all regulations issued by the President and the several depts. of the U.S. which are connected with the food problem.
