BIDDLE DOUBTS NEED FOR MASS EVACUATION

In a report to "Congress recently, Attor-General Francis D. ney Biddle indicated his about the need "doubt for removing all Japanese from the west coast," according to a nedispatch datelined WS D . C., Washington, b y Francis. of Warren B. the Los Angeles Times in the January 22 issue.

"While it is clear that most enemy aliens do not constitute a. source of danger to our national security, it was deemed wise to impose the restrictions to which I have referred because of that undetermined sinall group, who ere not loyal to the United States," Biddle said in his report.

"It is our aim and hope that these restrictions may be eased and that groups of enemy aliens may be freed from all restrictions as we become more and more certain

Every loyal American citizen of Japanese extraction should be fully aware of the great historical significance attached to the message which President Franklin D. dispatched to Secretary Roosevelt of War Henry L. Stimson.

For the first time in the brief history of their lives, the loyal Japanese Americans were directly recognized and assured of their priceless heritage of citizenship by the Cnief Executive of these United States of America. In the following 39 words, "The principle this country was founded on which and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is never was, a matter of not, and race or ancestry." President Roosevelt affirmed his confidence in the loyalty of the Niseis and offered every American of Japanese descent renewed faith and affiance in the democratic way of life.

At the same time, it served to silence those intolerant politiwho have been criticizing the Japanese American citizens and the WRA. It is indeed a sad commentary on our national history that such so-called patriotic statesmen and many influential members of the citizenry are unable to diagnose the true meaning Americanism; that it is, President Roosevelt & profoundly observed, a matter of the mind and heart and NOT a matter of race or ancestry.

However, it may be too much to ask that a comparatively young nation of 130 million pao le completely realized its fundamental aims, as stated so inspiringly and idealistically in our Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, within so short a period of Suffice it to observe that time. in the above-quoted message, our Presidents has conperspicacious tributed another milestone in unifying the free peoples and in realizing those Constitutional objectives.
