FIRE PREVENT PROGRAM
OUTLINED FOR CITY
BY FIRE DEPT.

Residents' Cooperation Asked To Curb Hazards of Flames Dangers

In a broad program designed to curb the fire menace in Poston, the Fire Dept today announced a series of regulations for this city. Officers in charge of buildings are urged to accept full responsibility for seeing that the following rules are enforced insofar as the relate to their buildings:

- 1. Open fires are prohibited within city, except at dumps or incinerators.
- Wooden containers such as cuspidors, other than metal, are prohibited in any building.

 Smoking is prohibited in or near warehouses, shops garages.

- 4. <u>Tampering</u> with wires is prohibited and defective equipment should be reported to your Block Manager.
- 5. <u>Oiled rags</u> and waste should not be left on floors or work benches. Use of inflammable liquids for cleaning purposes prohibited inside buildings.

6. 0il and gasoline stoves and heaters in buildings prohibited.

7. Boxes and discarded lumber must not be within 15 feet of any building.

8. Stove locations will not be changed except after location has been approved by rire Marshal.

 Hot ashes must be placed in non-inflammable containers.

- 10. <u>Blow torches</u>, soldering irons, etc, using owen flames, must he used only in designated isolated places.
  - 11. Drums or other cans containing gasoline, oil, narcotics,

- 12. Smoking or striking matches will not be permitted within 50 feet of shops or buildings in which flammable materials are stored or in use. A sufficient number of signs covering instructions to this effect will be posted in conspicuous places in all buildings in which highly flammable materials are being stored.
- 13. The use of fireworks in the City is prohibited, except under such conditions as may be authorized by the Fire Dept.
