COMPENSATION BENEFITS FOR EVACUEES INJURED ON DUTY

The status of evacuees injured or disabled while engaged in project work to receive compensation benefits was clarified by WRA Administrative Instruction No. 79, dated Jan. 13, 1943, Washington. Residents injured or disabled in line of project duty are eligible for compensation benefits under the Compensation Act of Sept. 7, 1916, as modified by the Act of Feb. 15, 1943. However, it is pointed out that these benefits do not extend to persons who are engaged in private employment, "such as employment by the consumer enterprises, by private employers operating enterprises at the relocation centers, or by evacuees who operate their own enterprises at the centers." The compensation benefits are provided for evacuees only while engaged in the performance of duties assigned to them in a duty status, or while traveling between their homes at the relocation centers and the place of assigned work.

All reports of injuries shall be given by the injured worker within 48 hours after the injury occurs, the directive stated, and special justification for failure to report an injury is required where a report is not made within 48 hours. The U.S. Employees' Compensation Commission, which is vested with the responsibility for the administration of the Compensation Act, is authorized to disallow a claim which is not reported within 60 days, and it may not allow a claim which is not reported within one year.

In the event of the injury of a worker, the Project Director shall be responsible for the following points: (1) To investigate the circumstances of the injury to determine

whether it was incurred in the performance of duty; (2) To advise the injured worker of the compensation benefits to which he may be entitled; (3) To assist the injured worker in the preparation of forms provided for the submission of compensation claims; and (4) To maintain a sufficient record of each case to ensure prompt attention to active cases. The Project Director is authorized to delegate such of the duties conferred upon him by the instruction No. 79 to a member of his staff.

Through Miss Ida G. Rees, expectant mothers are receiving a more adequate diet. People with ulcers or other slight ailments are beginning to get the attention that they so badly need.

"The children of Poston," continued Snelson, "under the new regulations established by the Steward's Office will be better fed and will receive an adequate nutritional diet. It is to be noted at this time that fresh milk should be given to the children and older people who may need it."

MECHANICS MOVE TO NEW QUARTERS

The garage has made a change of address from the old site near the warehouse area to the newly constructed shop situated across the road, east of Poston One.

For the staff of 2d mechanics, who "keep 'em rolling" in Poston, the new shop has approximately 4440 sq. ft. of working space; a large tool and locker room on one end, and an auto parts stockroom and office at the opposite end. For easy access to the shop and convenience, the building has three 24 ft. sliding doors, and three 12 ft. sliding doors.

Plans for future improvements and installations are: two parallel rail hoists; a grease and a wash rack; and a steam heat device. The over-all dimensions of the building is 168 ft. by 37 ft.

ROAD WORKERS HIRED BY W.R.A.

Clarifying the questions in regard to the worker's status in relation to the road construction, R. H. Rupkey, chief engineer, in a memorandum to Henry Sakaji, chairman of the Fair Practice Committee of Unit 3, stated that evacuee workers are employed by the WRA in a WRA project for construction of a main highway from Unit 3 to Unit 1 and north to the warehouse area at Parker.

Indian Service is operating with the RA by renting equipment such as tractors, power shovels, gravel plants, trucks, pumps, etc. The United States Engineers Dept. of the Army is cooperating by furnishing priorities for use in purchasing repair parts for equipments and materials and supplies to be used in the construction. The state of Arizona is not participating in the program.

The highway will be used almost entirely for WRA purposes, except for the portion of the highway passing through the area occupied by Indians and white persons between Poston and Parker. Use by the public will be permitted subject to WRA restrictions in the Poston area.
