FIRE HITS POSTON ONE

BLOCK 36 MESS HALL BURNS DOWN IN UNIT I. FIRE DEPT. COMMENDED FOR FINE WORK IN PREVENTING FURTHER CATASTROPHE: RESIDENTS AID CLEAN UP

A spectacular fire terrorized the community of Poston I early Monday evening when Mess Hall 36 suddenly turned into a blazing "fire-trap" inferno, causing much panic and confusion among the quad residents. No personal injuries were sustained.

The damaging fire, the first big one recorded in Poston, is believed to have started from a "heated chimney" which burned down the entire portion of the kitchen side, and grazing the complete interior of the dining section that the building will have to be torn down to the foundation. Destroyed or made useless were three refrigerators and stoves, all cooking utensils and sets of dishes and cups. All the food in the stockroom was lost, including the canned goods. It was also reported to be doubtful that any dining table could be used again.

Answering the call on the fire which began about 7:25 p.m., was Company A of Unit I Fire Dept., captained by Walter Shimahara and his nine firemen. Companies B and C, although off duty at the time, worked hand in hand with Shimahara and his crew. Fifteen minutes later, the blaze was under control, and at exactly 8 p.m., the last embers were quelled.

"We finished our work at 6 p.m.," asserted Teddy Ibe, chief steward of Blk. 36, and turned off all the stoves and left, locking the kitchen behind us. I believe the soot which might have accumulated in the chimneys could have remained heated, thus causing the ignition. (No confirmation on the actual cause was known at press time). A local resident sighted the smoking inside the kit-

chen about an hour and a half later. The flame enveloped the structure so rapidly fire extinguishers were ranned useless.

As to the temporary dining accommodations, the three other blocks within the quad 35-36-45-46, will serve the meals to some 254 persons until the new building is made.

Schedules have been planned where the Blk. 36 kitchen crew of 32 workers will be split into three groups to assist the kitchen in the other blocks.

GEORGE NAGAKURA, Blk. 36 Mgr. yesterday morning expressed his gratitude and thanks to those who assisted in the halting of the mess hall fire into further tragedy.

"In behalf of the residents of Blk. 36, our sincerest thanks to the Fire Dept. and to the people for helping us in our moments of danger and mishap.

SPECIAL MEETING HELD

CRASHERS TAKE NOTE

Some five-hundred students were deprived of pleasures due them, because of the actions of a few unthinking people.
