A spectacular fire terrorized the community of Poston I early Mor y evening when Mess Hall 36 suddenly turned into a blazing "firetrap"inferno, causing much peni; and confusion mong the quad residents. To personal injuries were sustained.

The damaging fire, the first big one record ed in Poston, is believed to have started from "heated chimney"which burned down the entire portion of the kitches side, and grazing the complete interior of the diaing section that the building will have to be sorn down to the foundation. Destroyed or note useless were three refrigerators an stoves, all cooking utensils and sets of dishes and cups. All the food in the stockroom was lost, including the canned goods.
