

FURTHER FOOD RATIONING SEEN IN POSTON

That the Postonians may have to face further food rationing in camp was seen in recent clipping from the San Antonio Light, (Jan. 17, 1943), which disclosed several thousand men at Randolph Field are now under "strict rationing" also, sharing the joys and hardships with the civilian population."

Lt. T.W. Berry, mess officer, said all enlisted men, cadets and officers will eat the new diet.

Coffee, for example, which in the past was served three times a day, will be served only 40 times a month -- a cut of 40 per cent. Tea, unrationed until now, will be served only 12 times a month; while cocoa will fill the cups only 10 times per 30 days. Sugar consumption is cut 20 per cent, and milk to half.

Going under the list of food items which is now rationed is butter, cheese, meat, canned goods like vegetables, fruits and various meat forms. Eggs will be in only half the quantity as heretofore.

While other military posts are yet unaffected by the new order in Texas, this community under the WRA, will eventually be affected by the nation's food shortage and rationing informed quarters revealed.

NO CERTIFICATE NEEDED FOR INFANTS SHOE

Other footwear for which no certificate is needed for its purchase are: soft soled moccasins, soft soled infant shoes ballet slippers, all shoe repairs, and infants' intermediate shoes with light leather insoles and outsoles of rough split leather.

SHIPMENT OF SMALL YAMS CAUSE "JAM"

In a recent shipment of small potatoes, as reported by the Steward's Dept., an inspection proved that they were small and ungraded. After the usual careful checkup by the inspecting personnel, a telegram was dispatched to the firm making the shipment, protesting the sending of substandard food into the camp.

It was learned that the potatoes had been ordered for the agriculture department for propagation of plants. This incident, it was pointed out, is but one of the many instances which show the conscientiousness of the Steward's inspecting crew. An inspection department for all perishable foods entering the camp has also been established, according to the Steward's Dept.

VOICE OF AN ISSEI

ON MENCIOUS

Years and years ago when this writer was back home, I had to take Chinese lessons and one day, I came across a line in Mencius, dealing in the matters of self-sacrifice. The line in question in the difficult Chinese ideograph had only four words in it which literally might be translated into something like this: ---

"Supreme duty annihilates filial relationship"

All the pupils in that class-room had to ponder on this single line and every one of us was saying then "what the heck does this mean?" Apparently, it was quite beyond our poor knowledge to arrive at a proper understanding the phrase conveyed and finally, we had to have our teacher expound the meaning of it for us. Here it is.

It means that the duty one owes to the land one is living on, comes first in time of need. It is called the supreme duty in the performance of which all other minor duties one may be subjected to in time of peace will be totally eclipsed into mere nothingness. It is essentially very important that the greatest emphasis should be attached to this form of supreme duty so that the society in which you lived might remain unimpugned and unmolested for your posterity.

The foe you may fight against may be your own kith and kin. It may include your own parents. But the supreme duty required of you by the State is not the respecter of any particular person of their relative status. It predominates every other consideration of duties which, in time of peace, you may be required to observe and perform. The supreme duty imposed upon your honor should be performed at any cost. Such is the text of the Mencius teaching.

Call to the colors! How very glorious and how truly thrilling! This supreme duty now commands you to come on out and serve for the country to which you owe your allegiance! Rejoice then and let your older generation feel proud of you in your voluntary action to serve for your own country.

The Mencius teaching quoted above may also apply in theory to us older generation. We are Americans in spirit--Americans without civil rights. We should serve if allowed. And it does not necessarily mean a treason against our own native country to do our share in this titanic world struggle. The feeling of decency alone bids us to do our best in the war effort since our beloved sons now pledge their life and are ready to spill their blood for the sake of their own country!

Come on out and show your Caucasian brothers that your Japanese blood is just as thick and red as their own!

WHY SAVE PURCHASE RECEIPTS?

It appears that patronage refunds will be made to members of the Consumer Enterprises based on the amount of purchases made and recorded. This means that the receipts will be worth money. This conclusion is based on the fact that the Consumer Enterprises will have to pay a Federal Income Tax amounting to a substantial proportion of the net surplus of the Enterprises, unless the Enterprises obligate themselves within the accounting period for which an income tax return must be filed to refund their earnings to the patrons on the basis of the amount of business transacted. In other words it may be concluded that the residents of Poston will decide to pay back to themselves (certificates of indebtedness or cash) the surplus or excess charges rather than pay the major portion in income tax.

In the case of the Manzanar Cooperative Enterprises, Incorporated the Bureau of Internal Revenue has held (1) that the Enterprises from its inception to December 31, 1942 (whether known as the Manzanar Consumer Enterprises or Manzanar Cooperative Enterprises, Incorporated) should be treated as one taxable entity for income tax purposes; and that (2) patronage refunds to the evacuees may be determined on the record of patronage for the period August 15 to December 31 and will be deductible in computing the net income of the cooperative for the taxable period ending December 31, 1942, provided that cooperative creates a bona fide liability prior to the close of the taxable period ending December 31, 1942 for the payment of the patronage refund by a suitable resolution or declaration. This means in the case of the Poston Enterprises that the surplus created from the inception of the Enterprises up to January 15, 1943 may be refunded to the members on the basis of purchases recorded from January 15 to June 30. If this is not done, then a substantial portion of the surplus will have to be paid as income taxes.

Let us assume for example that the surplus on January 15 was \$30,000. A distribution of this surplus on a per capita basis of 20,000 individuals would give each individual a share of \$1.50. However, if this method were taken income taxes would first have to be deducted from the amount to be distributed, and it is safe to conclude that the taxes would amount to at least \$20,000. Therefore, each individual would have left 50¢ instead of \$1.50. If the amount is returned to the people as above indicated on basis of purchases recorded from February 15 to June 30, then the entire amount of \$30,000 would go back to the people.

But there is still another drawback to saving the amount that would have to be paid as taxes—the decision of the Bureau of Internal Revenue referred to above applies to an incorporated cooperative. Therefore, the Poston Community Enterprises will have to be a cooperative to take advantage of the ruling of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.
