

RED CROSS WAR FUND DRIVE COMMENCES

MONEY TO BE USED FOR COMMUNITY WELFARE

An all-out drive for the War Fund in 1943 at Poston was disclosed today by the local Red Cross Chapter publicity manager, T.K. Shindo. The goal set this year in this community was \$2,500, of which the total sum will be spent here for the aiding of needed and other social welfare work.

"This War Fund drive is important", said Shindo, "because the community will be greatly assisted upon the results of the drive.

"We received notice from the Red Cross headquarters declaring we will be given the privilege to spend the raised fund for our own benefit. In other words, what help is needed in this community, will have to come out from this War Fund.

The drive which began Mar. 1, will continue all this month. It is anticipated that the goal set here will be met by the 30th, when it ends.

The Red Cross offices in the three units will accept donations from the local residents, it was announced here.

POSTON BIRTH RATE HIGH

27 babies were born for the 28 day period of February with the girls leading the boys 14-12. The stork delivered a total of 49 babies for the first two months of 1943.

The death rate for the month of February were 10, bringing the total deaths for the year to 17.

THE HEALTH SERVICE

BY PUBLIC HEALTH DEPT.

The Poston General Hospital was planned to meet the needs of an 18,000 population. The structure has a 250 bed capacity, but not more than 135 patients can be cared for at anyone time. This is because the Out-Patient Dept. occupies one ward and there are not enough trained nurses, nurse aids or attendants to give additional patients proper attention.

There are 12 graduate nurses, 9 student nurses, 65 nurse's aids, and 6 orderlies. Of these, 5 are Caucasians and 2 are nurses who were educated in hospitals of Japan.

There are many phases of service in a hospital, no one of which can be considered unimportant or menial. Absolute cleanliness is a first essential and to accomplish this, many individuals must do their part. The janitors or custodians, as they are sometimes called, are responsible for many duties, which though they may seem unimportant, are as essential as are skillful physicians and well-trained nurses.

Three more of these men are needed immediately and it is hoped this article will serve to stimulate sufficient interest to have capable men apply for these positions.

Food, good food, properly cooked and served, is necessary. This involves first the careful preparation of menus. Two hospital dietitians, and four helpers, and four nurse aids are engaged in this task and for the arranging of special diets, as order by the physicians. Making trays look attractive for poor appetites is also one of their duties.

The proper cooking is the responsibility of the cook and his assistants, all of whom serve under the guidance of a chief chef.

The hospital steward's responsibility is to order the supplies and to see that the kitchen-work is efficiently handled. He also supervises the cleaning of utensils and dishes. This is no small task as some of these have to be sterilized because they have been used by those with communicable-catching-disease, which may be passed from one person to another.

Drugs are dispensed by a chief pharmacist with four assistants.

The providing of clean bed clothes, towels, doctors and nurses gowns, surgical linen, etc. is vital to the safe conduct of a hospital. A modern laundry built and equipped at a cost of \$15,000 makes both washing and ironing simple, but man power is required. Three additional men are now necessary to assist those who are faithfully serving in the laundry to insure clean linen.

The housekeepers dept. is managed in a highly efficient manner with a small staff. In addition to the usual duties of handling linen and supervision of cleaning, the three seamstress mend and mend linen and do many other things which add to the comfort of patients.

The ambulance corps serve twenty-four hours a day in shifts of eight hours. Under a chief dispatcher, 12 men are so assigned that important calls requiring an ambulance can have im-

EDUCATION . . . NOTES

Under Miss Cushman, a testing program, given to elementary and secondary grades, is being carried on for the purpose of finding out how the standard of mentality of the Poston student stands. The test will also serve as a comparison for standards between students each year.

A donation of \$500 from McKinley High School was also accompanied by a \$70 donation from St. Louis College, a Catholic High School in Honolulu. Former St. Louis College buildings were taken over by the Navy for use as a hospital and the institution moved in with McKinley High whose student body has decreased considerably since the war, thus accommodating the College's 450 students. Mr. De Silva has been given charge of the donations. As McKinley High is able to get athletic equipment at a discount, the Ed. Dept. here has ordered equipment through them. Total equipment cost is said to be approximately \$700.
