Nisei women of Poston will be given an opportunity to speak with a WAAC representative who is here for a 3-day stay.

She was scheduled to be in Poston II this morning at 9:30 a.m. at the Christian Church. She was in Unit 3 yesterday afternoon to speak to the girls of that unit, and is scheduled to address the girls of that area. She will be in Poston I Friday.

Volunteers for the WAACS are not being accepted at the present time, it was disclosed. However, with plans now being worked out to induct citizen girls of Japanese descent, the Lieutenant is here to familiarize prospective girl applicants.

Between the hours of 1:30 and 3:30 P. M. this afternoon, Lt. House will be able to speak to individuals in Poston-II. Women over 21 years of age, their mothers and members of women's organizations are invited.

## UNIT-ONE NET WORKERS ELECT EXECUTIVE BOARD

About 200 workers in the Unit One net gar-nishing factory met Monday afternoon in Mess Hall 53 to elect an executive board to represent them in all dealings with the management.

Board members who will serve 3 terms are Bob Kinesita, chairman; Akira Aizawa, vice-chairman; George Kubo, secretary; and 5 departmental stewards:

Joe Kanda, Shed #1; Joe Kadawaki, #2; Frank Miyamura, reefers; James Chikahisa, warehousemen; Joe Kobayashi, cutters. When fully organized the executive boards will consist of 9 members.

The executive board supplanted a temporary committee headed by Harry Kumagai which was elected Saturday pending the establishment of the board.

## Residents May Apply For Shoe Certificates Any Time Says Nelson

Poston residents who have applied for shoe certificates should be patient in the matter of receiving their certificates, Len. Nelson, administrative ass't to the project director, declared yesterday. He revealed that the Parker OPA board which is handling the issuance of certificates has only one paid worker and is swamped with work.

Nelson disclosed yesterday that over 4200 applications have been made by Postonians.

Residents need not register immediately

for certificates, Nelson stated yesterday, in answer to rumors to the effect that those not registering will not be able to obtain certificates.

"Residents may apply for certificates at any time and they will be taken care of in due time." He revealed that certificates are good for only 30 days after the certificate is issued and will be void after that date if they are not used.

Re-application must then be made for another certificate, Nelson stated.

## Internal Revenue Men To Assist In Filing Tax

Two agents of the Internal Revenue will be in Poston next week on Monday, Tuesday and possibly Wednesday to assist residents with their tax problems.

One will be located in the Law Dept. in Unit I; on Monday, the other agent will be in Unit 2 Red Cross office and on Tuesday he will be in Unit III.

## "According To Your Faith..." "Sacred Obligations"

"Where there is no vision, the people perish." On that inspiring theme hung the reformation of impoverished farmers of the deep South to a life of affluence and happiness. For thanks to the vision, the faith, of George Washington Carver, the eminent Negro chemurgist, in himself and the simple, material things immediately about him the entire Nation was benefitted.

Those Japanese Americans and their parents who have apparently turned into sour cynics, it would do them well to read of the life of this man. While Carver is now gone on to another world, his influence, his philosophy of life, will always remain with us as a monument to what men can do with just the simple things of life.

Born of parents he never knew--they were carried off by slave-raiders when he was but a mere child--and faced with more discriminations and prejudism, more barriers than any Japanese Americans will ever experience, George Washington Carver carried on with faith in his heart. Today, his name is revered and symbolized with God in American households throuth the Nation.

The good Bible tells us, "According to your faith be it unto you." You Nisei skeptics who doubt this and doubt that, let's stop this self-pitying business! You're no longer a child. How do you expect to assume your responsibilities in the post-war period? By reverting back to the national Japanese complex of inferiority? Must you have everything "assured," handed to you on a silver platter, before you proceed to fulfill your life, even if they gave you the sun and the moon, will never be as full and complete as the life of the lowliest canine animal.

Shed your dark glasses, nisei! Remember George Washington Carver, who when told by cynics that the South's worst soil--sandy, eroded, and impoverished--was unproductive, merely kept his FAITH and demonstrated what any man can do with what he has.

"It was the only soil I had," he said. "But it was not unproductive. It was only unused."

It was only unused! Cease feeling sorry for yourself, nisei youth! And use your talents to assume

"Nation's Press Supports Nisei Combat Unit." So ran a headline recently in the Chronicle. The story quoted numerous editorial comments of influential newspapers throuth the USA, each recognizing the right of citizens to fight for their country, besides pointing out the propitious publicity value of such a team among the great mass of people who are ignorant as to the true Americanized characteristic of the loyal Nisei.

But no Japanese American should have cause to be overly-optimistic by the early favorable recognition on the part of the molders of public opinion. It is, admittedly, gratifying to know that we have the support of the press. But this is only the beginning.

The first and all-important task confronting the citizens is that of completely annihilating the pagan Axis foes. The loyal Japanese American, in company with 10 million men in the armed forces, is also faced with the problem of paving the way for a secure life after the Victory. Obviously no one can demand to find the solution to that second issue as those who are actually involved. Remember this phrase, trite tho' it may be: "When you want something done, do it yourself!"

The Nisei, however, is fortunate in that there are numerous influential agencies, such as the Church, the War Department, the press, and prominent citizens throuth out the Nation who are lending a firm and positive hand. Are you loyal Japanese Americans going to let them down? Here is your opportunity to fight for your rights! Join the Army! Work in a war industry!

Before any citizen demands any kind of guarantees and assurances of his government, he must first keep faith with his sacred obligations to his country. We demand loyal Japanese American to be sincere and faithful to his Nation, his posterity and to himself by denying the foregoing statement.

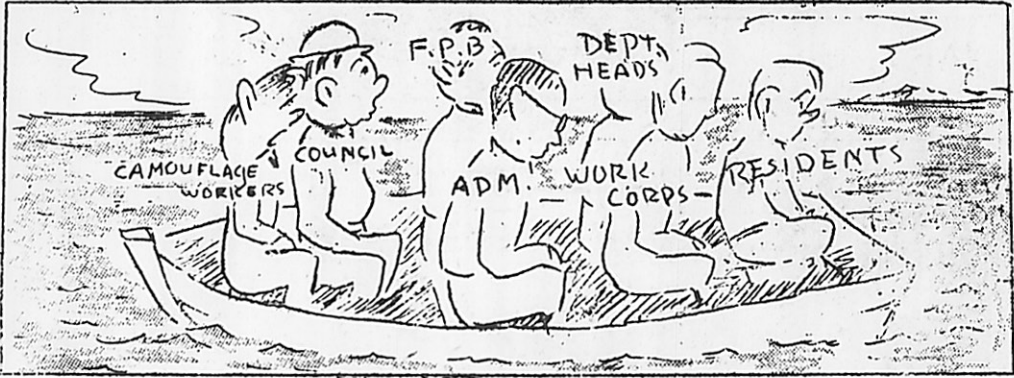

## EDITORIAL

## WE'RE ALL IN THE SAME BOAT



The Poston Councils, Fair Practice Boards, and the net garnish-workers should be congratulated for eliminating some of the wrinkles which prevented the camouflage project from advancing beyond its preliminary stages. All those concerned demonstrated conclusively once again the advantages of working under a democratic system, as the agreements were satisfactorily concluded without any intimidation or coercion by any particular group.

But before the factories may operate at its maximum capacities, there must be some definite adjustments made which will be in the most equitable interests of all the residents of the project.

Much of the previous controversy was centered around the matter concerning the percentage to be divided between the project work corps members and employes of the net plants. With the possibilities now of earnings 3 to 5 times the present average center wages of \$16 per month, it is natural for many of the evacuees to apply for work in the factories. This exodus of workers from the project to the net plants will naturally result in many inconveniences on the part of all the residents.

Already, many problems have become evident. This week some "ag" and "rec" workers of Unit I had to be recruited to assist with the all-important work of getting subsistence goods into the project. Then too, the merger wages and the clothing allowances of the residents have been held up, partly due, we are told, to the sudden shift of employes from the offices concerned to the net factories. IF THIS CONTINUES, IT IS A CERTAINTY THAT EVERY RESIDENT, REGARDLESS OF WHERE THEY WORK, ON PROJECT EMPLOYMENT OR IN THE CAMOUFLAGE PLANTS, WILL BE ADVERSELY AFFECTED.

Some equitable solution must be

found at once. In this respect we are gratified to note that both the Unit I Council and the department heads of Poston II are contemplating some sort of an action. But this responsibility lies not alone on the shoulders of the project workers' representatives but also should be the concern of the net factory employes.

Already there is some talk going on among the net workers to demand more "split" on the percentage end. If such selfish attitudes should continue to prevail, it may be necessary to close the plants, if only to maintain the peace and harmony which is so requisite a factor in a community such as ours.

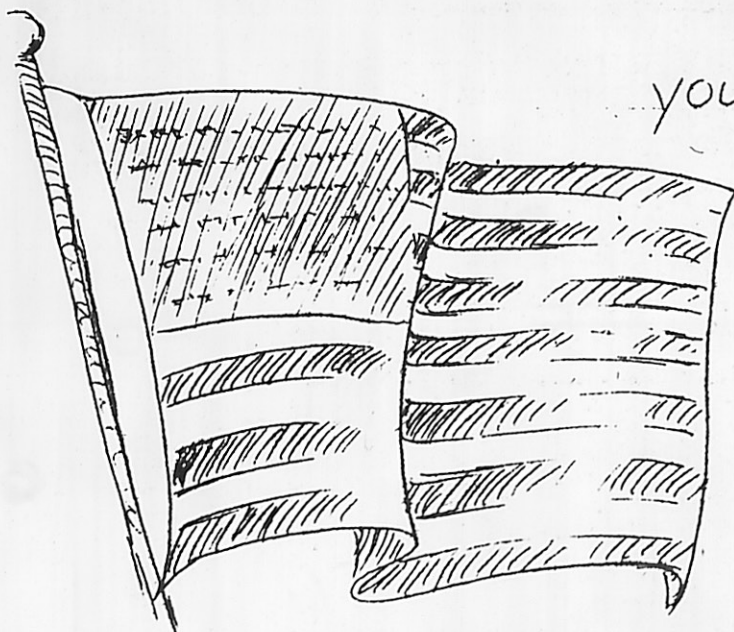
The Administration should lend every possible assistance to the evacuees in expediting the settling of this problem. There is absolutely too much "red tape" in too many departments. This should be as good a time as any to "clean house" and work out more simple routings and office procedure which will not necessitate so many forms and office workers. All appointed personnel members who can cope with the situation, and there are plenty of them, should be gently, if not forcibly, removed from their high-salaried posts.

The continued operation of the net garnishing factories is most desirable, especially from the standpoint of public relations. To that end, the representatives of the people, the work corps members and of the net plant employes, should meet their obligations to the Project as a whole and endeavor to arrive at a compromise that will be in the best interests of all concerned AND AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE.

We're all in the same boat. So let's keep personal selfishness and other egotistic thoughts away from the conference rooms. k.o.

LARGE GROUP HEAR WAAC OFFICER

Miss Cushman gave a short introductory talk in presenting Lieutenant House of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps at an assembly held for High School girls interested in the WAAC's neat the adde works last Wed. morning.

Lieutenant House's interesting talk to a large group of girls covered the duties and the type of work done by WAAC's, the atmosphere in the women's army, qualifications ranks, and compensations.

Lieut. House stated that the WAAC's are assigned to such work that can be done by women to release men for active service, such as administrative work-typing, clerical, and record work; communication--telephone, telegraph, and radio handling and repairing; motoring transport division---handling and repairing of light vehicles; cooking, photographic work, weather observers, laboratory technician, and other specialized work

Qualifications are: age limits, 21-45; mental and physical health; height, above 5 feet; weight, proportional to height. Rank and compensation are similar to the US Army's.

Lieut. House expressed her hope and confidence that the opportunity for joining the WAAC's would be offered to the girls of this camp.
