

MAN POWER SHORTAGE FELT IN POSTON

SURVEY TO BE CONDUCTED

In a previous meeting held earlier in the week, sponsored by the Labor Relations Board, several evacuee department heads including agriculture, industry, school construction, adobe, subjugation, steward, Labor Relations, Executive Board and TCC I, were present to discuss the man power shortage that was beginning to be felt here as the result of camouflage, leave clearances and Army enlistment.

It was decided by all the delegates present that the TCC be authorized to immediately start a survey to cope with the diminishing man power and devise ways and means to continue essential maintenance services that effect the welfare of residents.

Mrs. Sara Kido, Terry Kasuga, George Kurata, Seichi Nomura, and Franklyn Sugiyama from TCC I, Hiroshi Amano, Executive Board, Rev. Mitani, Labor Relations and Messrs. Nomura and Okazaki were named from the Issei Council to start preliminary work on the survey which will include representatives from the Administration.

Unit I Administrator John Evans, Industrial Supervisor Vernon R. Kennedy and Dr. John Powell, Recreation Dir, have already met once with the committees to start the discussion.

Invitations to delegates from Camp 2 and 3 will be sent as soon as the agenda is worked out in the preliminary meeting which was held last Thursday in the Executive Board of

With 2000 chicks arriving today for Unit I Ag. Dept. as subsistence need for the mess hall, the project is currently attaining the stage where the fowls, will be available for the mess hall within a short time.

UNIT I SCHOOL TO BE COMPLETED BY FALL

"Our goal", said Mr. Popkins, "is to have the schools ready by September. We are making every effort to reach that goal." Heaters have also been ordered for the schools in order that they may be available with the first sign of cold weather.

IN THE INTEREST



Many Nisei have bitterly assailed the Japanese American Citizens League for its policies, particularly for the course it assertedly pursued before and after the evacuation. It is singularly interesting to observe that the most vehement critics of the JACL are those who never participated in any of its program or, if they were past members, were affiliated in name only. In short, the most persistent carpers are those who are either pro-axis or egotistic and unfitted to assume their dutiful responsibilities or are grossly ignorant of the League's true aims and background. That there existed some shortcomings in its local setup is not to be denied, as a few well-intentioned castigators have pointed out from time to time. But neither do its officers claim any descendancy from supernatural beings and are, therefore, capable of committing misjudgments, which they are not averse to admit. But in the main, its officers have not deviated from its fundamental policies of enhancing the citizenship status of loyal Japanese Americans and promoting the general welfare of all Japanese faithful to those United States.

And today, despite the numerous unjustified charges laid at its door, every loyal American citizen of Japanese ancestry and their parents should be grateful for the continued existence of this all-American organization. Altho' acutely limited by the lack of support from those in whose behalf it is endeavoring to function and its consequent insufficiency of funds, the JACL is continually striving to assist in paving the way for the future security of all Japanese loyal to this Nation.

In this respect, they undertook one of its most laudable actions in entering, as a "Friend of Court, the case occasioned by the Native Sons of the Golden West. The JACL represented by A.L. Wirin as special counsel with Saburo Kido and Walter Tsukamoto, filed its brief in the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco to contest the NSGW's axis-like attempt

to revoke the citizenship rights of American-born Japanese. THAT THE CASE WAS DISMISSED, THEREBY UPHOLDING THE CITIZENSHIP STATUS OF THE NISEI, IS NOT AS SIGNIFICANT AS THE FACT THAT THE JACL CONFORMED WITH ITS POLICY OF STRUGGLING IN THE INTEREST OF THE NISEI.

Refuting the charge that it does not consider the status of Issei, the JACL will appear again as a "Friend of the Court" in the California District Court of Appeals at Los Angeles in support of the basic property rights of both the alien and American-born Japanese.

In regards to the aforementioned two cases, listen to Attorney Wirin: "I have accepted the privilege of serving the JACL as one of its attorneys...because of a pre found conviction that...I shall be furnished with an additional opportunity, as well as obligation, to fight the good fight on the home battlefield not for the rights of American citizens of Japanese descent alone but for all the minority, racial and political groups throughout the United States.

"It is with this spirit that I deem the decision of the JACL staff to appear in the Federal and California state courts a vital step of major significance in the general struggle to preserve the rights of all the people."

Significant, too, is the fact that besides Wirin, Kido and Tsukamoto, the JACL is also represented by two Negroes--noted attorney Hugh E. MacBeth of Los Angeles and Thomas L. Griffith, Southern California chairman of the National Ass'n for the Advancement of Colored People.

The JACL may have made its share of errors. But the good that it is attempting to do should more than counter-balance what little mistakes in judgment it may have committed and FINALLY, SHOULD DESERVE THE WHOLE-HEARTED SUPPORT OF EVERY FREEDOM-LOVING JAPANESE AMERICAN because it is the only Nisei organization dedicated to their cause of justice and liberty.

And before censuring the JACL or, for that matter, any person, thoroughly digest (If you dare!) this bit of pertinent advice which Jesus gave unto his disciples (from the Gospel of Matthew): "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye?...Thou hypocrite, first cast out the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see, clearly -to cast out the mote out of thy brother's eye."
