LEAVE CLEARANCE PROCESS SPEEDED UP, WRA OFFICER ASSURES POSTON RESID

Residents of Poston interested in obtaining indefinite leave permits were assured by Herb Keno, associate relocation supervisor of tho. Chicago office, that the processing of applications has been speeded up.

Mr. Keno, arriving directly from the here Washington office, will make every effort to pave the way for speeding up the leave clearance work, he disclosed in a statement to the

Chronicle.

Admitting that there has been a delay in the processing of clearance applications, Mr. Keno pointed out the numerous difficulties faced by the War Relocation Authority in handling Lack of of the work. fice help and lack of office equipment such as file cabinets were only a few of the problems encountered.

Now, however, the staff has been in→ oreased tenfold, the associate relocation supervisor declared. applicants with outside job offers can expect to be cleared within a week or two. Only in a few unusual cases will longer time be taken to clear the applicants.

editorial !

With the speeding up of the resettlement program, a new chapter has been opened in the life of the Japanese American. The uprooting from old homes and the temporary detention in relocation centers are going to be things of the past. There is good reason to believe that our co-operation with the military in the eva-cuation step will be repaid in full before long. And if anyone continues to complain about that past, he is being blind to the new

opportunities being offered.

Of course, in a nation at war, the demands on every citizen--outside as well as within the centers -- will be greater than what we had known prior to evacuation. Whatever we choose to do in the total effort of the country--whether it be the growing of food, the production of armaments or the actual fighting on the battle fronts -- the need for vigor, vigilance and sacrifices must be met. But, as we re-locate and assume our rightful place in Ameri-ca, we shall be in the same position as the majority of the people. We will have realized what long we strived for.

Of course, the future for us will not be all rosy. Racial antagonism will not evaporate overnight. Individual cases of prejudice and discrimination must be overcome. The thing that counts, however, is the evident fact that more and more chances will be offered us for work in war plants and productive farms. . Instead of being segregated in camps, the major-icy who are able and willing to bear their share of the war burden will be in the stream of American life before many months, if the program in progress now continues successfully as anticipated.

By answering the nation's call for man power gone a long way towards solving we will have what temporarily loomed as a difficult race minority problem. Let it be recorded that Nisei had the courage and strength to lift ourselves by our own boot straps when given

ATTORNEY HENDESY STATES PROJEDURE FOR REHEARING APPLICATION

"Applications for a rehearing of an alien internee's case should be presented to the U-nited States Attorney of the District where the internee resided," Frank J. Hennessy, U.S. Attorney for . the northern district of California pointed out in a letter received yes-terday by the Poston Daily Chronicle.
