

SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE MET WITH POSTON LEADERS

CENTERS NOT TO BE "TURNED OVER" TO ARMY S.Y.S., MALONE

"The bill in the Senate proposed by Wallgren (Washington) and Holman (Oregon) is not aimed to separate the relocation centers from the WRA to the U. S. Army", declared George W. Malone, special consultant to Senator Chandler's subcommittee of the Senate Committee of military affairs, Sun. afternoon in W. Wade Head, Project Director's office, where he met with 20 leaders from the 3 units.

"It is an attempt to bring the relocation centers to the public attention. It is a feeler; it is a sort of trial balloon that has been launched to settle a very difficult post war problem now," continued Malone, who was acting for Senator Chandler, who could not conduct the hearing.

Col. Wm. P. Scobey of the War Dept. General Staff was also present at the hearing as an interested observer.

Malone, requested a statement on the recent response to the volunteering of Nisei, the reaction to draft and any theories pertaining to post war relocation.

"The residents here were led to believe Lt. Bolton's statement in his public address that draft was imminent. As doomed men, all of us want to enjoy a few more additional weeks of civilian freedom. Consequently, the volunteers might not have been as many as expected", Franklyn Sugiyama, said. He also pointed out that the evacuees and their families had proven their loyalty by peacefully leaving their homes and that there was not a single conviction against them (cont on page 2)

COUNCILMEN DISCUSS NET FACTORY CLOSING

"Give the camouflage workers 35% and let the Council keep the 65% was one of the sentiments expressed in the TCC I meeting last Sat. at the adult Education office. Other Councilmen wished to close the camouflage factory down entirely as it stopped the vital maintenance facilities on the project such as a warehouse, hospital, due to the exodus of the nurses' aides, messhalls and other essential services.

After a spirited debate on the Council floor about the existing manpower shortage and possibilities of a greater pinch when the mass leave clearances start, it was decided to wait further action until after the survey being conducted on manpower by the TCC I and the Administration heads was completed.

This survey group will present figures on the manpower, how many are working in the factory, how much income will be derived from the factory, and other information pertinent to the distribution of the factory income to the community.

EVACUEES MAY FARM IN PARKER VALLEY

"There is a possibility that the Japanese evacuees might be able to farm some acreage in the Parker Valley this year as the result of the recent order by the Army in making our territory here a free zone. William Dudley of the Evening Post told Franklyn Sugiyama, Roy Furuya, Mr. Evan's assistant, and Masao Iwatate, editor of the Japanese section of Unit I Chronicle, on Sat. at the Post,

According to Dudley the U. S. Employment Office, a week ago, agreed to bring help to the local farmers by importing a few families from Missouri.

"Had we known about the Army's intention of making Parker Valley a part of the white zone, we certainly would have preferred Japanese evacuees to Missourians," said Dudley.

Dudley said that there was a farmer's general meeting to be held on Tues. evening and at that time he promised to get the reactions from the neighboring growers.

W.W. Head, Proj. Dir. has asked the superintendent of the Parker Indian Reservation, Mr. Gensler, for a plot chart, locating the empty acreage that might be available if the proper arrangements could be made. The plot chart will be forth coming in a few days and at that time more definite plans might be worked out.

in a any recognized court for reasonable acts against the U.S., and thus they are anxiously awaiting freedom.

Dr. Ishimaru explained that the recent order opening the Salt River Valley to Japanese might be taken as an indication of the complexities of the problem.

"There are about 250 people in my block from Arizona. They sold everything before coming here. Only 2 or 3 families will be able to go back. The others will not go back. The others will not go back because they have nothing to go back to," Ishimaru stated.

"After living here almost a year with the Caucasian administration", Maeno stated "they ought to be able to spot the good candidates to insure their speedy relocation on this side." He went on to emphasize that this was a major problem and it must be solved with intelligence.

The hearing lasted less than an hour. Maenos and Col. Seehey have returned to Washington, leaving the project immediately after the conclusion of the hearing.
