300 Minidoka Volunteers For Army

The Nisei of the Minidoka Center at Hunt, Idaho, did themselves proud and greatly contributed to the future security and welfare of the Japanese in the U.S.A. by gaining favorable nationwide press notices this week.

The press pointed out that a total of 300 Americans of Japanese ancestry had volunteered for service in the United States Army. According to an official WRA press release the number represented 19 percent of those eligible for army service. (It contrasted sharply with approximately 6% of the total eligible in Poston who were reported to have volunteered.)

Of the 300 volunteers at Minidoka, 41 were reported to be married, of whom 24 have children and 11 were Japan-born. While the latter group is not

MANPOWER COMMISSION SETUP PLANNED IN POSTON | LABOR CAUCUS SET FOR MAR. 12, 13

The establishment of a manpower commission to cope with the labor shortage in Poston I occasioned by the opening of the net camouflage plants, Army enlistments, and the WRA relocation program is being contemplated at the forthcoming manpower conference sponsored by the Unit One temporary community council, Council Chairman Franklyn Sugiyama revealed yesterday.

Week's Notice Required For Job Change

Effective immediately, all workers must give their department heads at least one week's notice before changing jobs, Project Director W. Wade Head announced today.

It was stressed that this applies to changes from one department to another within the Project as well as to workers planning to work in the net garnishing factory. Department heads are authorized to refuse job releases unless this notice is given.

However, this procedure in no way interferes with the worker's right to select his own job in any department in the Project or in the net factory.

"Notice of quitting," Head said, "is a courtesy long recognized in employment and I am sure that all employees will see the fairness of it and will cooperate willingly and cheerfully."

To avoid misunderstanding, it was suggested that notice of intention to change jobs be given the department heads in writing by the workers.

NISEI VERSUS ANIMALS...

The shallow reasoning of some Nisei is at times indeed discouraging and disgusting. Back in California during our high school days, we use to be proud of the high scholastic standards attained by the Japanese Americans. But it is to wonder now if their "brilliance" in studies was due only to their ability to memorize their texts, rather than to their ability to reason rationally and think for themselves.

Which brings us to the more or less regretful fact that there remains today in these relocation centers many Nisei who are still embittered and primed with cynicism and despair because of the consequences of the evacuation. Undoubtedly, many of them have just cause to be skeptical and disillusioned by the events which have occurred since Pearl Harbor. But surely, they are not so blind as to have lost complete sight of the necessity to maintain something akin to Faith in their hearts. Ever since the time immemorial, men have been persecuted, have been faced with exasperation and frustration. But unlike animals, men have the God-given brains and the heart with which they may overcome obstacles. A dog or a lion, when defeated, will merely lick their wounds and let nature take its course. Animals live in a world of survival of the fittest.

And so do men. But in the lives of mankind, it is survival of the fittest to the extent of their mentality. For animals, it is merely physical. Surely, those discouraged Japanese Americans are greater than mere four-legged creatures? The desirable things in life, someone once said, must be fought for; life itself is nothing but a series of battles. Nothing in this wide world is "guaranteed" or "assured."

Our great nation itself was founded on Faith. Faith in God and in the sanctity of man. The fathers who founded our country were never "guaranteed" their liberties, they had to fight for it and against greater odds confronting than that which the Nisei of today. Verily, we say unto you, have faith and courage in your hearts as Jesus told his disciples "Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Now is the time to prove yourself to be greater than the animal.

LABOR CAUCUS MAR. 12, '43

The Council of Unit One was authorized on March 3 by "interested departments" to hold a manpower conference to cope with the labor shortage situation which is disrupting the normal and necessary project work activities. Representatives of Poston II and III have also been invited to participate in the discussions, Sugiyama revealed yesterday, and the answers of John Nakamura, and James Takashima, Units' II and III Three council chairmen, respectively, were reported to be very cooperative.

It was stated that six preparatory committees for the conference were chosen as follows: Food--C.E. Snelson, Terry Kasuda and Seichi Nomura; Administration--A.W. Empe and Hiroshi Amano; General Welfare--Dr. John Powell, Mrs. Sara Kido and Bob Okazaki; Construction--Mr. Warnock, George Kurata and Hane; Manpower--Len Nelson and Labor Relations Board; and Outside Income--Vernon Kennedy, and Labor Relations Board.

The reason advanced for inviting representatives from Units II and III was stated as follows: "As the preliminary groundwork was laid, it was seen that in the warehouse, garage, hospital, project administrative offices, many people in Unit I were engaged in work that did not have any bearing on the welfare of their own Unit, where they reside but were engaged in activities that concerned Units 2 and 3."

The conference is scheduled to be held from 9:00 a.m., through the entire day on Friday and Saturday at Ward 7 of the Unit I hospital.

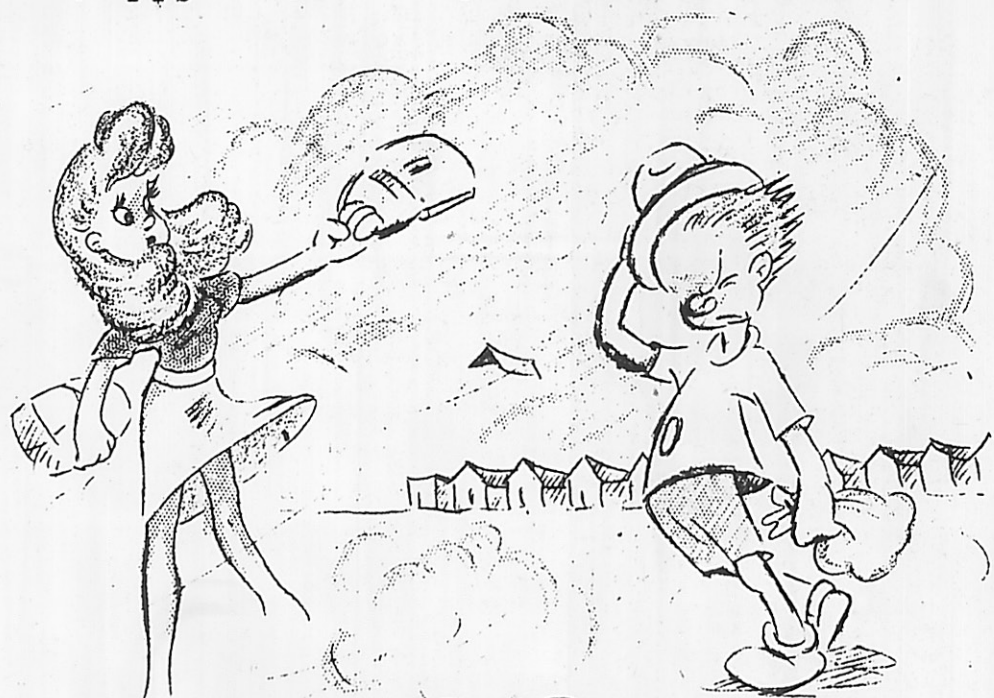
