300 Minidoka Volunteers For Army

The Nisei'of the Minidoka Center at Hunt, Idaho, did themselves proud and greatly contributed to the future security and welfare of the Japanese in the U.S.A. by gaining favorable nationwide press notices this week.

The press pointed out that a total of 300 Americans of Japanese ancestry had volunteered for service in the United States Army. According to an official WRA press release the number represented 19 percent of. eligible for army service. (It, contrasted sharply with approximately 6% of the total eligible in Poston who were reported to have volunteered.)

Week's Notice Required For Job Change

Effective immediately, all workers must give their department heads at least one week's notice before changing jobs, Project Director W. Wade Head announced today.

It was stressed that this applies to changes from one department to another within the Project as well as to workers planning to work in the net garnishing factory. Department heads are authorized to refuse job releases unless this notice is given.

However, this procedure in no way interferes with the worker's right to select his own job in any department in the Project or in the net factory.

"Notice of quitting,"
Head said, "is a courtesy long recognized
in employment and I am
sure that all employees will see the fairness of it and will
cooperate willingly
and cheerfully."

To avoid misunderstanding, it was suggested that notice of intention to change jobs be given the department heads in writing by the workers.
