SNELSON EXPLAINS MENU SET UP

Poston chief cooks will be able to prove whether or not they can really cook with rationing of meat, stated Project Steward Snelson recently. Under the meat rationing to go into effect March 29, nutritional diet can be prepared with the ingenuity of the kitchens.

"It may be," said Snelson, "that under the meat rationing program the country will eat better, as rationing tends to equalize the distribution of food."

"Poston residents are fortunate in having a hog ranch here, which will assure us of pork in the coming months," he continued.

Commenting on the improvement of the Unit I kitchen crews in the past 2 weeks, Snelson congratulated the chief cooks on their good management, and added that the storekeepers are also bringing good results.

On the subject of lunches for workers outside, Snelson stated that due to the shortage of meat, the problem is a difficult one. Persons receiving the lunches are asked to report their likes and dislikes, and blocks having large numbers of net workers will be sent materials to improve the lunch situation. Unit 2 and 3 let workers eat in the mess halls, as they are closer to home.

On the recent addition of pork neck bones to the Poston menu, Snelson stated that (Cont. on page 2)

CANVASS OF BLOCKS FOR NURSE AIDES APPROVED

In response to an SOS call from Dr. A. Pressman, Director of Public Health and Sanitation, the Unit I TCC passed without dissent George Kurata's motion asking every block to be canvassed for at least one nurse aid candidate. The meeting at which other health problems were also discussed, was held Wednesday evening at dining hall 21. It was suggested by Kurata that Units II and III follow suit.

Pointing out that technical help was needed badly at the hospital, Dr. Pressman warned the Councilmen of a likely curtailment in medical service unless assistance was forthcoming immediately.

At the recent hearing conducted here by the Senate Subcommittee through George Malone, consultant to Senator A.B. Chandler, Dr. Pressman stated:

"Tuberculosis is a rather serious problem. We have found 180 cases of pulmonary tuberculosis of which 67 are active and 113 arrested. Hospitalized at present are 35 cases.

Richard Nishimoto disclosed that the public Health Department was working upon a rest home for patients. Unoccupied barracks at Unit II would be used. It was moved that the Project Director and the three Community Councils act jointly in making possible the opening of the rest homes, which could be used for those with tuberculosis.

Franklyn Sugiyama, chairman, was authorized to represent the TCC at the coming manpower meeting.

After a considerable amount of heated debate, Frank Fukuda's motion was passed. It provides for: (1) prevailing minimum wages for project workers, (2)

BUREAU OF SOCIAL RELATION CREATED

A plan calling for the formation of a Bureau of Social Relations was approved recently by the TCC, it was reported yesterday.

The new body will be centralized around the existing social welfare and public relations committees.

The need for creating this body grew out of the fact that a large number of cases have been submitted to the Labor Relations Board and the Executive Committee, which have been swamped with work.

The Executive Board was empowered to appoint members to the Social Relations Bureau, which will consider cases outside the jurisdiction of the law.

The Executive Board will take up the case if satisfactory settlements cannot be reached.

FAIR PLAY COMMITTEE URGES NISEI TO BELIEVE IN IDEAL AMERICA

The Committee on National Security and Fair Play, composed of prominent Americans, is carrying on a fight to protect the constitutional rights of minorities, and, in an open letter to citizens of Japanese ancestry, Galen M. Fisher, committee member, urged Nisei not to let them down. His open letter to all Nisei follows:

Dear fellow-citizens of Japanese ancestry:

Letters asking counsel on registration and the combat unit have come lately from several centers. Instead of simply replying to the individual inquiries, I am going to be bold enough to write this open letter to all Nisei, not to give unasked advice, but to report how the issues look to me and all the other genuine friends with whom I have talked. By "genuine friends" I mean Caucasians who are fighting to protect the constitutional rights of all minorities, especially of Japanese-Americans.

Let me say right off, that all of us, without exception, feel it would be a serious mistake for you not to register and to cooperate whole-heartedly with the War Department and the W.R.A. in forming the Combat Unit, as well as in applying for release for free resettlement, unless family conditions prevent.

We know that you have been cut to the quick by the tough experiences of the last year, not so much the physical hardships, as the denial of a chance to prove your loyalty and make your utmost contribution to the war effort. Many of us have shared your sense of grievance on this account, and have worked persistently to bring about a change in Government and in the public mind. But most of you have swallowed your grievances and endured the "slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" with marvelous patience, in the spirit of patriots ready to serve the country to the limit. Knowing as I do the tragedies of which you and your loved ones have been a part, my heart bleeds for you. But all this makes me and your other steadfast friends all the more anxious that you do not now let objections to the manner of the registration or pent-up resentment over past treatment make you flout the Government's offer.

As to the Combat Unit, high officials labored for months to bring it about. Those who now refuse to cooperate with the War Department will be throwing down, not only the liberal Army officials, but also the President, for on February 1st he wrote to Secretary Stimson endorsing the plan and testifying to its high purposes in these words: "I am glad to observe that the War Department, the Navy Department, the War Manpower Commission, the Department of Justice, and the War Relocation Authority are collaborating in a program which will assure the opportunity for all loyal Americans, including Americans of Japanese ancestry, to serve their country at a time when the fullest and wisest use of our manpower is all-important to the war effort."

Refusal to cooperate will also poison the

public mind against all evacuees, for the anti-Oriental reactionaries could say, "We told you so; they were disloyal all along, and now their true colors have come out." It would give a most effective item of propaganda to the Axis. And it would hamstring groups like the Fair Play Committees that are working to preserve the democratic rights of Nisei and all minority groups. Right now the Committee on American Principles and Fair Play is being formed to carry on that fight. President Sproul is Honorary Chairman, Maurice Harrison is head of the Advisory Boards, Dr. A. C. McGiffert is Executive Committee Chairman, and Mrs. Harry Kingman is Executive Secretary. General Barrows, Dr. Henry Grady, Dr. Robert Millikan, Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur and many other leaders over the west coast are backing it. I feel sure you won't let us down, but will continue to hold fast to the ideal American, even though the real America, under wartime pressure, has fallen far short of her ideals.

INTRODUCTION TO THE STUDY OF POLIOMYELITIS

As a dangerous threat to the residents of Poston III has occurred in the form of poliomyelitis, commonly known as infantile paralysis, excerpts from material on this disease will be printed in a daily series on this page. All citizens of Poston are advised to take careful notice of the subject as the invasion of this disease may be more effectively and quickly checked if the people are fully informed on the subject.

Poliomyelitis is an acute contagious disease, which may vary in severity of infection and locality of paralysis, according to Dr. M. S. Lombard, District Medical Director. Incubation period is from 7 to 14 days, and most prevalent in children of pre-school and school age groups, with an average incubation period of 10 days.

It is communicated either by methods still unknown or by human carriers. There appears to be some relationship between nearby bodies of water and such cases that offer no suspected source of infection. However, human transmissions may be either by direct contact or through healthy carriers. These carriers may be found among adults, females predominating, who are capable, perhaps temporarily, of communicating the disease to susceptibles.
