The meeting at which other health problems were also discussed, was held Wednesday evening at dining hall 21. It was suggested by Kurata that Units II and III follow suit.

GUREAU OF SOCIAL RELATION CREATED

A plan calling for the formation of a Bureau of Social Relations was approved recently by the TCC, it was reported yesterday.

The new body will be centralized around the existing social welfare and public relation committees.

The need for creating this body grew out of the fact that a large number of cases have been submitted to the Labor Relations Board and the Executive Committee, which have been swamped with work.

The Executive Board was empowered to appoint members to the Social Relations Bureau, which will consider cases outside the jurisdiction of the law.

The Executive Board will take up the case if satisfactory settlements cannot be reached.

FAIR PLAY COMMITTEE URGES NISE TO BELLEVE IN IDEAL AMERICA

The Committee on National Security and Fair Flay, composed of prominent Americans, is carrying on a fight to protect the constitutional rights of minorities, and, in an open letter to citizens of Japanese ancestry, Galen M. Fisher committee member arced wise not to Fisher, committee member, urged Nisei not to let them down. His open letter to all Nisei collows:

Dear Fellow-Citizens of Japanese Ancestry: Letters asking counsel on registration and the combat Unit have come lately from several genters. Instead of simply replying to the individual inquiries, I am going to be boldencugh to write this open letter to all Nisei, not to give unasked advice, but to report how the issues look to me and all the other genuine friends with whom I have talked. By "genuine friends" I mean Caucasians who are fighting to

ities, especially of Japanese-Americans. Let me say right off, that all of us, without exception, feel it would be a serious mistake for you not to register and to cooperate

protect the constitutional rights of all minor-

whole-heartedly with the War Department and the W.R.A. in forming the Combat Unit, as well as in applying for release for free resettle-

ment, unless family conditions prevent.

We know that you have been cut to the quick by the tough experiences of the last year, not so much the physical hardships, as the denial of a chance to prove your loyalty and utmost contribution to the war effort. Many of us have shared your sense of grievance on this account, and have worked persistently to bring about a change in Government and in the public mind: But most of you have swallowed your grievances and endured the "slings and arrows of outrageous fortune" with morvelous patience, in the spirit of patriots ready to acrve the country to the limit. Knowing as I the tragedies of which you and your loved ones have been a part, my heart bleeds for you. But all this makes me and your other steadfast friends all the more anxious that you do not now let objections to the manner of the registration or pent-up resentment over pust treatment make you flout the Government's offer.

As to the Combat Unit, high officials labor-ed for months to bring it about. PRINCIPAL FOREMAN INTRODUCTION TO THE STUDY OF POLIOMYELITIS

As a dangerous threat the residents of Poston III has occurred in the form of poliomyelitis, commonly known as infantile paralysis, excerpts from material on this disease will be printed in a daily series on All citithis page. zens of Poston are ad-vised to take careful notice of the subject as the invasion of this disease may more effectively quickly checked if the people are fully informed on the subject.

Poliomyelitis is an acute contagious di-sease, which may vary in severity of infection and locality of parelysis, according to Dr. M. S. Lombard, District Medical Director. Incubation period is from 7 to 14 days, and most prevalent children of pre-school and school age groups, with an average incubation period of 10

days. Ĭt is communicated either by methods still unknown or by human carriers. There appears to be some relationship between nearby water and bodies of such cases that offer no suspected source of infection. ' However, human . transmissions may be either by direct contact or through healthy carriers. These carriers may be found among adults, femeles predominating, who are capable, perhaps temof communiporarily, or cating the disease cating to susceptibles.
