The step was taken in accordance to the Arizona State fish and game law which requires fishermen to apply for license in ot-der to fish in the State. This regulation is similar to the Cali fornia Law since each state has a jurisdiction of ten miles beyond the Arizona-California border.

The leniency during the fishing period in 1942 was merely due to unestablished status for the evanuees and no machinery was set up in the State if Arizona t o meet the influx of the Poston population.
